ARMY LIFE QUITE GOOD

Sports And Entertainment Described In Letter From Overseas

What the Canadian troops do in their spare time overseas, especially in connection with sports and entertainments, is interestingly described in a letter received in the city from an officer in one of the units as follows:

"We happen to be looked after by the Knights of Columbus. They supply the men with recreational equipment, cribbage and chess and checker boards, darts and other types of games, playing cards, footballs, softballs, horseshoes and volleyball equipment and there are both unit and area leagues for all of these. Most of our men would sooner play hardball but, due to the amount of equipment required and the expense, we have been unable to obtain any although there are about ten units, mostly battalions, that have teams. I saw them playing one game and, believe it or not, they even had the Englishmen awakened up and making the odd remark about the blindness of the umpire.

"During the winter months they carry on army wrestling and boxing bouts and we have the eastern Canadian army 118 pound champion and an ex-professional wrestler of the Man-Mountain Dean type who sees that our laurels are upheld.

"The K. C.'s equipped our unit with three sax's, two clarinets, two trumpets, a violin and set of drums and have been trying to get a piano for us as we have a real orchestra. We used to have our own amateur concerts twice a month in Canada and have some real talent in the unit but, with the long summer nights and the minds occupied in other directions, we haven't done anything

about it over . . . will be starting again shortly.

"My batman is a little short Frenchman, just about as broad as he is tall. He is individually about the best entertainer in the army. He can whistle like nobody's business (you should hear him whistle "The Mocking Bird.") He can tap dance not quite as well as Bojangles Robinson but is in a class by himself and he has quite a good baritone voice although all his songs are necessarily in French. We have of course a number of yodellers and the odd lad who can sing "Home on the Range" type songs so all around we manage to get along. As a matter of fact our orchestra is assisting some London artists at a big concert to be held at one of the training centres with Bedford and a lad by the name of Ramage who has a remarkably good tenor voice. Our drummer is an American lad who used to play the drums in one of the American name bands and he can make a set of drums talk. We can stack against the best of them our pianist (He has an A. T. C. M.) whose favorite trick is to play the Rhapsody in Blue through a blanket over the piano and he plays just the same. One of our officers could catch a place as a sax player with almost any orchestra. Their favorite number is "The Snake Charmer." We borrowed a piano for a while and when we had it here the three of them used to spend about three hours each evening putting on a show for all and sundry. Taking everything together, we don't do badly and the auxiliary services issue about twenty cigarettes and a chocolate bar every two weeks so, between entertainment and welfare we are kept plenty busy.


