A MATTER OF PERSONALITY

Mayor Newton yesterday morning received notice from the Bank of Montreal that no more money would be forthcoming for an indefinite time for the city whose affairs are in his charge.

Last night the mayor called together his finance committee, and his council, and together they sat down in the city hall to consider things. The upshot of their deliberations was that Mayor Newton discovered after various estimates by various aldermen, ranging from \$200,000 downwards, that there is in the city treasury for him to sign cheques against, only about \$16,000.

That the Bank of Montreal is right here for business every citizen knows. What bank has the most permanent building in the city? That the Bank of Montreal has absolute confidence in the city of Prince Rupert every citizen is certain.

The situation resolves itself simply enough, into a problem of personality. The personality of the Mayor, the personal of his finance committee probably—does not appeal to the bank in a manner to inspire the confidence that induces an outflow of capital into any legitimate channel, however well placed for security.

GOOD PROGRESS ON BIG BRIDGE

First Span of Skeena Bridge Completed—Piers Nearly All Finished—Trains Across By Middle of July

The contractors on the steel work on the Skeena Crossing bridge are making splendid progress and this week they completed the work on the first span. The steel is being completely riveted as it is laid and this will take somewhat longer than had the contractors used false work.

While this work is being carried on Foley, Welch & Stewart have gangs of men working on the piers and getting everything ready for the steel men on the several smaller bridges between Skeena Crossing and New Hazelton so that as fast as they can get the rails over the big bridge the steel men can start on the smaller structures which will not require much time to complete.

Every effort will be made to get the steel into New Hazelton as soon as possible so as to get away from the bad roads between the bridge and that town. New Hazelton will also be the transfer point for some time as there is a lot of heavy work to be done between there and Mud Creek, and the road from New Hazelton east is in pretty good shape for transporting supplies to the camps farther out along the line.—Omineca Herald.

GRAND TRUNK R.WY. AFFAIRS

Prospects of the Company Are Promising — Wage Increase is Noted

Notwithstanding the big increase in expenses beyond control, said Chairman Sir Alfred Smithers at the Grand Trunk railway meeting at London, recently, the management was able to show an improvement of one per cent on third preference, making one and one-half for 1911.

Concerning the Grand Trunk Pacific grading, branch lines were completed, and rails would have been laid if Canadian steel companies could have delivered rails. Arrangements were made within the last few days whereby American mills will deliver rails.

Referring to labor difficulties, Mr. Smithers quoted what he said in October 1910, that the persistent demand for higher wages was felt not only in Canada and America, but throughout the world. It was not use weakly railing and vainly expecting wages to go back.

The report was adopted without discussion.
