## Many Links Missing

It seems as if an effort is being made to show that Canada is holding up the work of constructing the Alaska highway and it is possible this is to some extent true. So far as we know there has been no public discussion as to who is to pay for the road and how. The general opinion seems to be that the United States will pay the bill but the government of that country is not committed to that expenditure. The probability is that the work is held up by discussions as to the proportion each country will pay and who will be responsible for the construction. Evidently the highway is being discussed as a defense measure that will benefit United States most and Canada only in a secondary degree. There is also the connection with Southeastern Alaska through Prince Rupert that is being considered. While Prince Rupert needs the highway, it will also benefit Alaska very greatly and a fair proportion of expenditure has to be worked out. We hope that any plan adopted by the two governments concerned will not be decided on too late to be of real use as a defensive measure.

## Russia And Germany

The German official announcements have turned out to be so far incorrect that it is quite impossible to take notice of them. Occasionally the Russian reports seem to be exaggerated but they are so much more nearly correct than their opponents that many people refuse to believe any of the German reports, relying wholly on the Russians to tell them what is going on.

There evidently also are people who listen only to reports they like. Those with pro-German inclinations listen to German reports and those who are pro-Russian listen only to Russian reports. Just now evidently Russia gets most of the listening for the average person here seems to be pro-Russian.

Acropolis is Winner—Mean Trick at Seal Cove

After a very close contest with Seal Cove, Acropolis Playground was declared winner of the annual sandbox competition Thursday afternoon.

The affair was marred by an unfortunate happening at Seal Cove. The gardens were decorated beautifully with many varieties of flowers and the whole presented a very pleasing and accurate replica of the actual scene.

Tracing of Family Trees Shows Connection of Local Interest

John McCrae, the writer of "In Flanders Field," who died in action in the First Great War. It is, therefore, an interesting coincidence that there should be this relationship between the soldier-poet whose work contained those famous words "Hold high the torch" and the young local naval officer, Lieut. Jack McRae, who recently escorted across Canada the "Torch of Victory" that was later presented to Prime Minister Winston Churchill in England.

The McRae's all come from Ontario. Despite the variation in the spelling of names they are all of the same Scottish family originally, having come many years ago from Lauriston, Scotland.
