ROTHER IS WAR VICTIM

Harry Johnson Of Smithers Bereaved By Casualty In Nazi Attack—Third To Die For Country

Harry D. Johnson, formerly Prince Rupert and now of Smithers, has just received word that his brother, Patrick Joseph Dunlop, was lost at sea while on duty as engineer on the steamer "Geraldine May". He had been on the steamer "Letitia" cruising off the coast of Greenland for six months. This vessel was ordered to be tied up for repairs and the crew was transferred to the "Geraldine May". Two days from London the vessel was sunk by a U-boat. Mrs. Johnson's brother, a fireman and first mate losing their lives.

Two other brothers of Mrs. Johnson, James and Thomas Francis Dunlop, were killed in France in the last war.

The late Mr. Hansen was a well known salmon fisherman. He was 59 years of age and a native of Denmark. He had lived here for seventeen years.

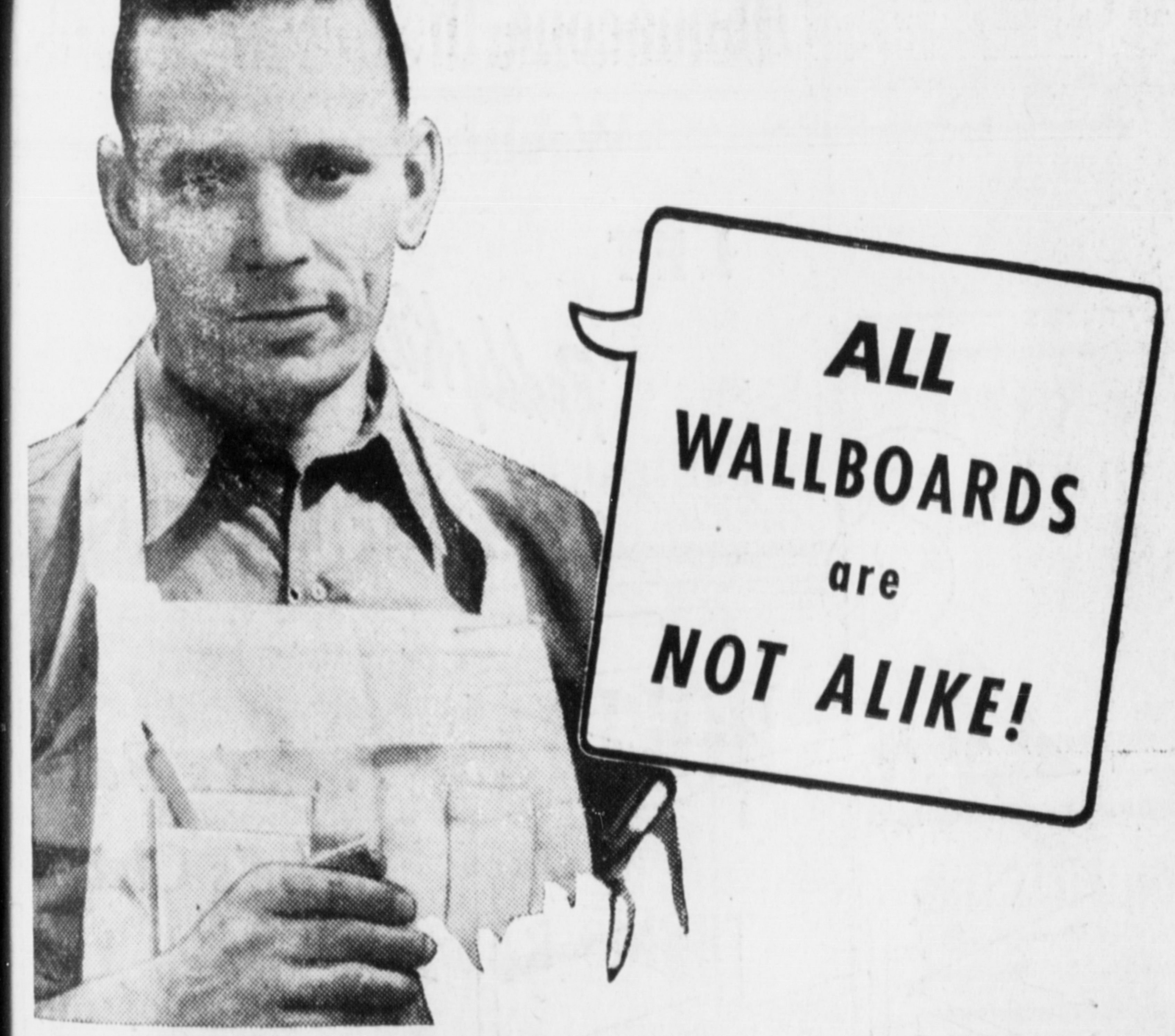
