The African Army . . .

Of the quarter of a million African army that has been sweeping the Italians out of the country, something like eighty thousand are made up chiefly of natives of India, men from Rhodesia and Arabs and Sudanese and other various groups including free Frenchmen. These were not all taking part in the taking of Tobruk. Part of the British army is proceeding along the coast of Africa carrying everything before it. Other fortified points will be taken as occasion requires but with as little as possible loss of life to the British. Naturally another part of the British army must remain in or near Egypt.

Effect Of Victory . . .

The taking of Tobruk and the further advance across the north of Africa is bound to have a great moral effect on the whole of Europe. It will strengthen the resolve of Spain to keep out of the war and will also have an effect on Portugal whose ports could be used with good effect against Gibraltar. It may have the effect of speeding up the invasion of Britain which is the only way in which Germany can hope to win anything substantial. It is now clear to Hitler that no victory can be complete without the subjugation of Britain. He cannot hope to win a substantial sea victory and air victories will soon be out of the question. He must act soon if he is to do anything.

The Need Of Today . . .

The great need of the Canadian government today is money in order that it may do its part in helping carry on the war. This money it wishes to borrow and pay interest on it. Part of the needed money is being raised by taxation as we are all coming to realize.

The need of the Empire today is more money with which to speed up the war. If we all pay we can win. The thing to do today is to buy as many war certificates as possible. Buy them now and buy regularly. That is the best way just now to help win the war.

Show Lindbergh He Is Wrong . . .

The British people are determined to show Colonel Lindbergh that he is wrong. Negotiated peace is useless when dealing with a crooked devil like Hitler whose boast is that he is a liar. The work has started well in Africa and it will be extended. Germany today is suffering from air attacks and she will suffer more before the war is over. Lindbergh has shown several times that he is a friend of Germany and the best service he could possibly do that country is to arrange for a negotiated peace.

Trophy Play Is Centre of Interest At Smithers

SMITHERS, January 24—Play in the Hanson Cup curling tournament is drawing to a close and will be completed by the end of this week. It appears that several teams may be tied for first place and may have to play off for the cup. These are the rinks skipped by A. Eviitt, Ward Carey and Frank Johnson. The Eviitt rink got away to a poor start, losing the first three games played, but, in a fine reversal of form, won the next seven games straight and was well away for the cup. However, in the final game of the series played on Wednesday night, the rink skipped by Len Evans set Eviitt's back with a loss of 4 to 15 which will probably put the rink into a tie with one or two other rinks that still have some games to play.

A mixed bonspiel with two men and two ladies to each rink will get under way over the week-end after which the tournament for the shield and other bonspiels will be played.

A fine cup has been presented by the Home Oil Distributors for the Ladies' Curling Club and will be played for this winter. This is the first winter that the ladies have been organized and they had no trophy previous to this to spur them on.

The weather has been ideal for curling all through the winter, excepting for a few days when it was too mild for the sport.

It is expected that three rinks will go from Smithers to Prince George for the bonspiel there on February 10. They will enter into competition for the big Kelly cup, emblematic of the championship of the north, which was brought to Smithers last winter by Art Simpson and his rink. The Downey rink also brought home trophies from last year's tournament there and both these rinks will be back there this year to hold their trophies.
