

GREAT BATTLE FOR KIEV

MOSCOW-A big battle for industrial Kiev, capital of the Ukraine, has opened with terrific fighting at the approaches to the city, the Russians reported today. The Russians said they were beating back the Germans with stiff counter-attacks. At one point the Red Army detachments were said to have destroyed several German regiments, killing and wounding more than fifteen thousand men. Large scale fighting also continued at the approaches to Leningrad and along the central sector of the front before Moscow.

WONDERFUL FIGHT BY RUSSIA

LONDON-An authoritative British source said today that German losses in the war with Russia thus far are believed to total about 1,750,000 and Russian losses from two to three millions in the bloodiest fighting in history. This source said "none can overpraise the Russians' conduct of the war. They are magnificent and proved the sincerity of their scorched earth promises by blowing up the Lenin (Dnieper River) dam."

R.A.F. FOLLOWS UP

LONDON-Following up the attack on Berlin said to rank among the heaviest of the war, the Royal Air Force last night unloaded bombs at Brest, Nazi-occupied French naval base. All British planes returned safely.
