### TRAIN TIME SPEEDED UP

Fastest Time Yet Being Made Between Montreal And Maritimes

MONTREAL, March 6.—Faster time between Montreal and Halifax with the establishment of the "Ocean Limited" as an exclusively all sleeping car passenger train and the addition of a complete new fast train, "The Scotian," making three trains daily operating between the two cities, are announced by C. W. Johnston, general passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railways.

The increase in train capacity and the speeding up are in response to the growing volume of passenger and express traffic between the terminal points and the important cities between Montreal and Halifax which has been occasioned by Canada's war effort. Demand on existing train space has become very heavy and for a considerable time it has been necessary to operate the "Ocean Limited" in extra sections.

By the faster schedule which will come into effect on Sunday, March 16, the "Ocean Limited," in its new form as an all sleeping car train with complete air conditioned equipment, 50 minutes will be clipped from the running time between Montreal and Halifax. West bound from Halifax to Montreal the improved edition of the "Ocean Limited" will cut off one hour and twenty minutes from the present schedule.

### ACROSS CANADA

Angus Kerr Tells How He Makes a Living on Farm At Quick

A farmer in this country should be a butcher, a lumberjack, a veterinarian and a trapper in order to get the most out of his place, according to Angus W. Kerr of Quick, whom I met on the train on my way to Toronto. Angus was taking advantage of the cheap rates to make a trip to his mother's home not very far from Ottawa taking his young son with him. I was going to Toronto to attend a convention of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association.

Mr. Kerr is a neighbor of Dan Greene, another farmer who sometimes writes letters to the papers and is now working in the Post Office at Prince Rupert. Mr. Kerr evidently finds the world pretty good as it is and makes the most of it. He has only a small place on the hillside, 100 acres in all and only part of it is cleared. Every year he clears a little more, so his farm is growing all the time.

As I say, I met Mr. Kerr on the train. He was looking out of the window showing his son a moose that could be plainly seen a short distance away. He said he had seen six moose that morning on his way to the station. At this time of year they were very numerous.

Asked more particularly as to how he made a living on a farm in that part of the country and still have enough money for holiday trips, Mr. Kerr said that the trapping season had just closed and he had cleared \$250 from the pelts he had sold. Some season he made twice that amount and sometimes the catch was quite small and prices poor. He had a few cows which brought in a small but regular income from cream. Cream was selling for nearly twice the price it fetched last year. Now and then he killed a steer or a pig. He also killed cattle or hogs for other farmers. He did not charge his near neighbors anything for butchering but usually he was paid a dollar each for killing.

He also raised small acreages of grain, most of which was consumed by the stock. Most of his neighbors, he said, made a living off their farms, paid their taxes and lived fairly well. The Greens, for instance, had a very nice place. He liked the life.
