800,000 Troops Poised In Balkans

LONDON, March 25: (CP)-Germany has approximately 800,000 troops fully equipped for immediate battle in the Balkans to ensouthwest and to guard the Russian frontier, a reliable source declared today.

It would not be surprising to some military observers here that, now YugoSlavia has signed up with the Axis, Germany would give the order to attack Greece, probably through Bulgaria.
