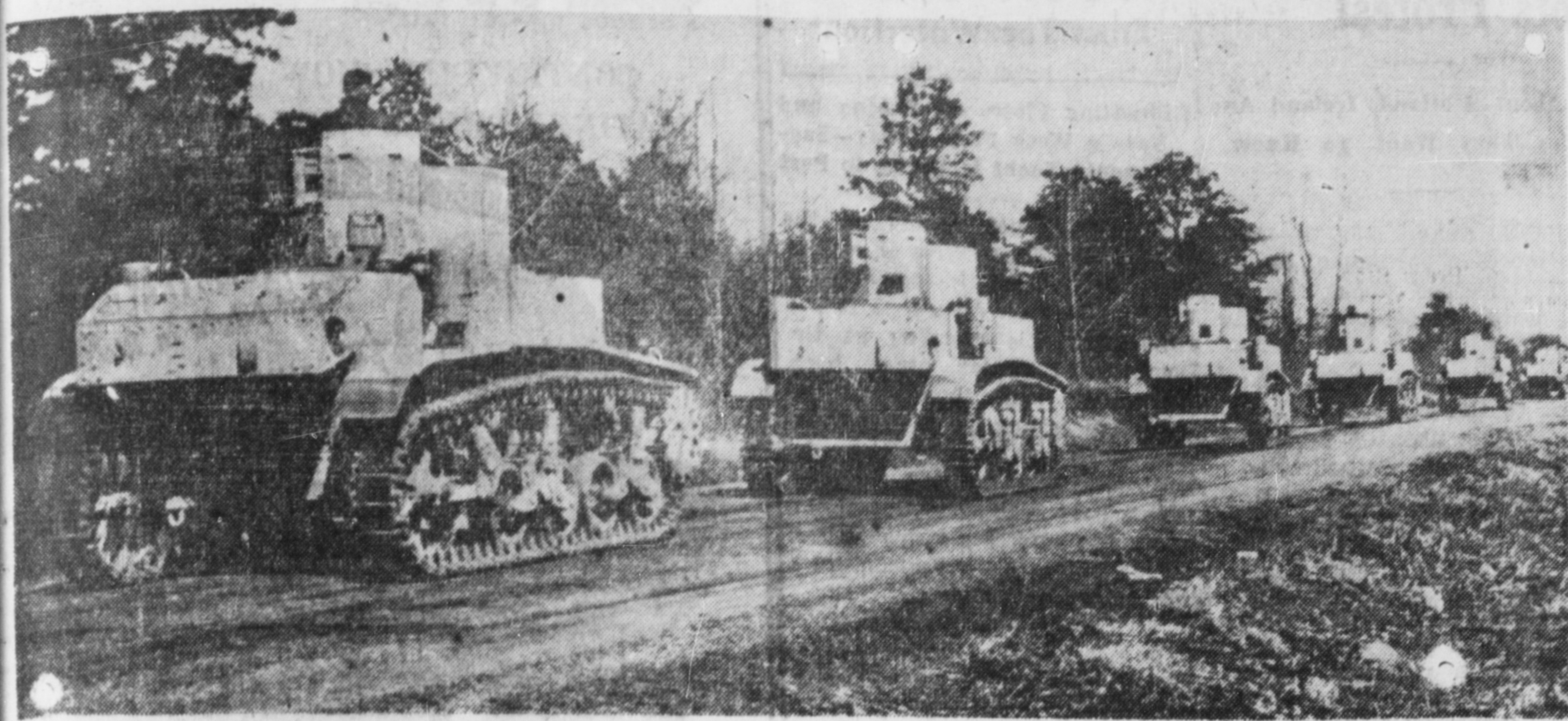

Sir Pelham F. Warner has invited Lieut. On that occasion he played against M. C. C. at Lord's. Before leaving for the United Kingdom he played for Camp Borden in the Ontario Rugby Football Union.

Still agile and formidable, he paired off against Bronko Nagurski, the ex-Minnesota University grizzer, recently, huffed and puffed 60 minutes to a draw with that husky.

With rare forethought, Pesek declines to become specific about his age, thus preserving an ever available topic for speculation.

HAVE OWN SCHEDULES

Fifteen Soccer Teams In Revolt Against Touring Schedule In Wartime Soccer

LONDON, August 15: London football clubs, in protest against long trips arranged for them in next season's schedule, have withdrawn from the Football League and arranged a tournament of their own.

Eleven London clubs, Reading, Aldershot and three teams not yet chosen will play in the new league, called the London War Football League. Each team will play 30 matches with the balance of the season being filled by a cup competition.

The withdrawal was the result of the league's arrangement for London clubs to visit such places as Swansea, Cardiff and Norwich. "We have gone exhaustively into the whole situation and after the most careful consideration it was the unanimous decision of every club that we were not in a position to accept the responsibilities thrown upon us and we reluctantly decided to withdraw," George Allison, manager of the Arsenal, said after the meeting at which the decision was made.

Under Old Rules Rules of the new league will be the same as those laid down for Football League play and all matches will be on a points basis. The Football Association will be asked to sanction the London competition.

Withdrawal of the 16 teams from league play has thrown the football league's arrangements for south regional competition into chaos as special arrangements will have to be made for the handful of clubs still in the official competition.

Two Other Air Force Men Second And Third For Trophy

WINNIPEG, August 15: Gerald Backhouse, member of the 1936 Australian Olympic team and now a student at the No. 3 Wireless Training School here, won the three-mile Tribune trophy road race here while two other airmen were the runners-up.

Backhouse, a member of the Royal Australian Air Force, handily beat C. R. McMullin of Arnprior, Ont., and Dan Lorch of St. Vital, Man., who finished second and third. Only two others of the 11 starters finished the race, run during a hot, sultry day. Backhouse won a heat, finished second in a semi-final heat and sixth in the 800 metres final in the 1936 Olympics.

Sudbury Soldier Finds Relatives

Looking For His Sister A Canadian Found His Mother Also In England

LONDON, August 15: On leave, Pte. Edwin Alfred Baker of Sudbury, Ontario, tried to locate his sister, and in his search was reunited with her and his mother too.

Baker, who went to Canada from England 20 years ago when he was eight, returned to his native land with the Canadian forces. He was told his sister was nursing at a hospital in Watford. He travelled to Watford and by chance showed a porter at the hospital a photograph of his mother. The porter recognized her as one of the hospital workers. Mrs. Baker took her son to his sister who had moved to London.
