Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, Jan. 29: (AP)-It takes an average of \$224 a year to clothe the professional woman. And when you get into the individual prices paid for garments, she turns up more of a Cinderella than the office siren about whom all the triangle thrillers have been writ-

The \$224 is not an ideal clothes budget worked out by some flintyeved economist. It's what 209 professional women actually spent on their clothes during 1939.

The group agreed to jot down every penny they spent, from fur coats to shoe shines and sent the results to the Bureau of Home Economics.


