Crack Regiment Band Appears For Red Cross

Sunday night at the Capitol Theatre the Prince Rupert public will have the opportunity of seeing and hearing the finest regimental band in Western Canada. Through the courtesy of Col. J. E. Wood, V. D., officer commanding, First Battalion, Rocky Mountain Rangers, the regimental band will make its first local stage appearance on behalf of the Prince Rupert Canadian Red Cross Society.

The band has been in existence for 45 years and was reorganized after the Great War. In 1925 Lieut. O. W. Sjoquist, its present director, was appointed director of music.

In November last the band was requested to give an audition for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and was slated to be aired on a C. B. C. program but, due to unforeseen circumstances, it was impossible to fill the engagement. The war-time strength of the band is 27 pieces and it has recently been equipped with new English instruments valued at \$5000.

A splendid program of band numbers, solos, etc. has been arranged by Lieut. O. W. Sjoquist. Capt. F. H. Allwood, entertainment officer of the R. M. R.'s handled the arrangements for the presentation of the concert and will appear as master of ceremonies.

SUNNIEST FEBRUARY

The sunniest February in the meteorological history of Prince Rupert was recorded in 1941. The sunshine, as officially recorded by the Dominion meteorologist at Digby Island, totalled 102.1 hours. The precipitation amounted to 4.53 inches including a considerable amount of snow which rates ten to one when reduced to precipitation figures. So far this year there has been 139.1 hours of sunshine compared with 115.9 hours in the first two months of 1940. The precipitation so far this year amounts to 13.84 inches compared with 8.40 inches in the corresponding period last year.

Maximum temperature, 57 on February 3.
Minimum temperature, 24 on February 22.

Maximum wind velocity, 34 miles per hour from southwest on February 4.

MRS. MANDY DELIGHTFUL

Travelogue of North Intrigues Audience at First United Church

An outstanding entertainment was the illustrated lecture entitled "Up North" presented at First United Church last night by Mrs. Joseph T. Mandy. A large audience enjoyed the screening by Dr. Mandy of colorful pictures and a graphic narrative in fine elocutionary style by Mrs. Mandy. The program lasted about two hours and there was not a dull moment as picture after picture of the great northland was projected upon the screen to be delightfully described by Mrs. Mandy with fact, anecdote and romance.

Starting with a few scenes of such points as Banff, Lake Louise, Vancouver and Victoria, the travelogue moved up the coast to Prince Rupert. From there on there was an extensive tour to the great wide open spaces of the north including islands near Prince Rupert, the Kit-sun-kalum Lake country, Queen Charlotte Islands, Portland Canal, Unuk River, Alaska Coast, Stikine River, Dease Lake, Liard River, Squaw Creek, Atlin Lake, Skagway and ending up with a trip over the trail of '98 down the Yukon River from White Horse to Dawson.

Among the descriptions by picture and word which proved entrancing to the listeners were those of mining activities, gorgeous rugged scenery, wild and native life and various modes of transportation. There were views of remote places some of which few white men, let alone women, have ever visited. Personal incidents at various points also proved diverting.

Before Mrs. Mandy's lecture, the audience was delighted with an appropriate vocal solo by Mrs. H. T. Lock, accompanied by Mr. Lock.

Rev. J. C. Jackson acted as chairman and Miss Swana Olafson played pipe organ selections. Usherettes were Mrs. Clarke McLean, Mrs. T. Fraser, Mrs. G. L. Rorie and Mrs. George Pearson.

Lieut. Col. J. J. Burton-Willison, who has been stationed here for some time as officer commanding the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps, left on last evening's train for Camp Borden, Ontario. He does not expect to be returning to Prince Rupert.

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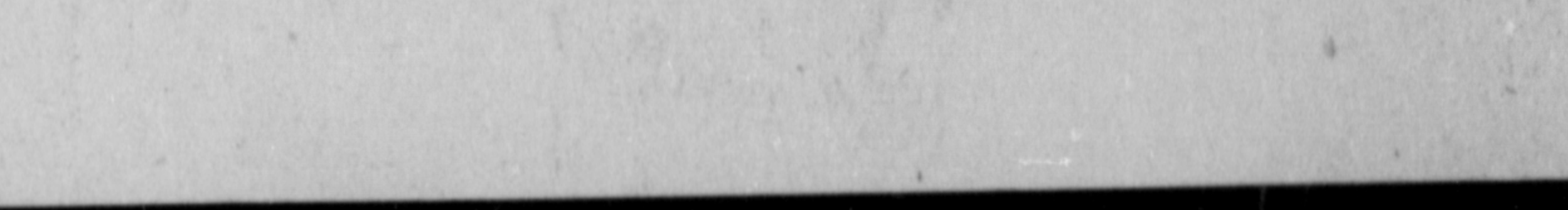
