**Justifies New Report Cards**

Inspector Of Schools Asks Teachers And Parents To Be Receptive Modern Ideas

During these years of educational expansion, dissatisfaction grew with the old methods of reporting pupils' progress and a great deal of study was made by prominent educationalists to construct report cards which would be consistent with the multiplicity of subjects studied and with modern methods of instruction, said Inspector of Schools Alex Turnbull in addressing the Prince Rupert Parents' Teachers' Association Wednesday night. Some of the earliest of these studies discovered serious faults in the old method of reporting by means of percentage marks and rankings based on such marks. Experiments recorded in both America and England, for all of which there is documentary evidence, showed extreme variability in marks assigned to the same examination papers by different teachers. For example 142 English teachers marking high school papers gave a range of marks all the way from 64 to 98. One hundred and eighteen teachers graded a geometry paper all the way from 28 to 92. In some cases the element of fatigue caused a teacher marking a large set of papers in one evening to vary his standard of marking considerably. On the whole these experiments proved that the old system of marking with "passing" or "failing" marks was influenced to a high degree by unpredictable personal equations from one teacher to the next, all using a set of arbitrary values, each unrelated to the other. Coupled with the old system of marking was the method of comparative ranking which had many objectionable features. Too many parents were concerned with nothing but their child's mark in class.

**Old System Weak**

To offset the weakness inherent in the old system of assigning arbitrary values use was made of the normal curve of distribution. At this juncture, Mr. Turnbull explained what was meant by the normal curve of distribution and how it was applied to give better grade ratings which to a large extent reduced the former variable factors in grading. The new report cards introduced by the Department of Education were an attempt to reduce further the personal and variable factors in reporting. Wider groundings were used with a series of symbols for their interpretation. In the new report cards achievement took the place of the old ranking and marking. The work habits of the pupil were carefully reported upon, the subject teacher using as a basis standards which were clearly set before the pupil. Since modern education placed emphasis not only upon scholarships but also upon character development, personality and the building of better citizens, each subject teacher was required where possible to report upon such things as habits, attitudes, interests and the development of worthy ideals and skills. Though the making out of these reports necessarily entailed considerable time and careful observation by the teacher, this, in the opinion of the speaker, was more than compensated for by the knowledge which the teacher would gain of his pupils.

In concluding Mr. Turnbull asked that patient and enlightening interpretation on the part of those administering the reports should be given and that the parents should give them a fair chance to prove their worth.

Mr. Turnbull's instructive and timely address was much appreciated by a large audience.

Hinds are also prominent members of the cast.

**Whifflets From The Waterfront**

Local Halibut Operators May Process Halibut Livers—Ambitious Work on Fish Oils—Overage Fund Discussed

Faced with a reduced offer this year from 50c to 30c per pound for halibut livers and with only one bidding company apparently in the field, halibut boat operators at Prince Rupert and elsewhere on the Pacific Coast are again considering the possibilities of going into the business of processing their own halibut livers. No definite steps with this end in view have been taken but the situation is being actively canvassed.

Regarded as the most complete treatise on the subject of fish oils generally and the largest single publication issued to date by the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, "The Chemistry and Technology of Marine Animal Oils with Particular Reference to Those of Canada" has just made its appearance. It is edited by Dr. H. N. Brocklesby of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station and the contributors include Dr. B. E. Bailey, Dr. Neal M. Carter, K. F. Harding, Dr. L. I. Pugsley, Dr. W. A. Riddell, Miss N. I. Rogers and L. A. Swain. The 442-page document discusses the chemistry of fish and marine animal oils and fats, their various components and production, processing, refining and utilization with a chapter on the properties of particular individual oils and fats together with development of acidity and other chemical changes.

Halibut vessel owners and fishermen were in joint session last night at the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union Hall to discuss matters in connection with the overage fund under the curtailment operation. Carl Giske, one of the trustees of the fund, was in the chair.
