



Gordon T. German Reviews Activities And Accomplishments Of Junior Chamber During Year

Activities and accomplishments of the Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce during the past year were reviewed by the retiring president, Gordon T. German, in his report presented at the annual meeting last night of that organization. The report indicated not only a substantial measure of activity by the Junior Chamber and its members in a variety of community undertakings but also that a healthy and effective interest had been taken in many public questions.

The Christmas Cheer broadcast had been resumed, Mr. German reported, and the sum of \$473 had, as a result, been collected by the Salvation Army of which \$345 was spent for Christmas cheer, over sixty hampers of foodstuffs as well as ruer and clothing being distributed, the balance being used for lergency relief during the year.

Following the practice of a number of years, the Junior Chamber again undertook to decorate street lamp standards during the Christmas season.

In the promotion of the sale of war savings stamps and certificates members of the Junior Chamber took an active part. One of the members had acted as secretary of the local committee. Dinner assessments had been increased from 50c to 75c, each member being given a war savings stamp in return.

Members of the Junior Chamber had also been active in the canvass for funds on behalf of the Canadian War Services fund, one of the members acting as treasurer and others as team captains and solicitors.

One of the major efforts during the past season, of course, had been the raising of funds for the proposed civic centre. The members had been quite prominent in a carnival sponsored by Gyros, Rotarians, Sons of Norway and Junior Chamber, acting as chairman, secretary, treasurer and also taking an active part in games and concessions.

An effort had also been made to assist in the collecting of orders for cigarettes and tobacco for the British Columbia overseas tobcco fund but the response had been disappointing, only thir.ywo orders with a total value of \$52 having been received.

Questions Dealt With

Among questions 'which had been discussed and, in some cases, handled by committee, were complaints of soldiers' wives in regard to excessive rents, failure of the Rowell-Sirois commission plan clean and paint up campaign, tourist attractions, traffic and speed regulations, salvage materials for war purposes, advisability of holding a census this year and civic health.

Reporting on membership, Mr. German announced that there had been a net gain of eight from thirty to thirty-eight not including eighteen of whom were serving with His Majesty's forces. Eighteen new members had been enrolled during the year, ten having dropped out for various rea-

Relations with the Senior Chamber, Mr. German reported, had stood the test of time and today were on a better footing than ever before. The wisdom and experience of the seniors was always respected and it was hoped, for the benefit of all, that harmonious relations should continue.

Mr. German thanked all members for able assistance, expressing appreciation particularly to the secretary, T. J. Williams, for his loyal co-operation, support and wise counsel. He was also grateful to the executive commit-


