Erection As Hut For Use As Hostess House Is Now Being Considered

With a view to the establishment of a hostess house here at which wives and lady relatives and friends of local soldiers may be accommodated while paying visits, the local committee is now working along the line of interesting the Young Men's Christian Association and Young Women's Christian Association in erecting a hut for the purpose of providing the necessary accommodation.

Another meeting on the subject of a hostess house was held last night with Capt. R. C. H. Durnford, area padre, presiding and others in attendance including the local executive consisting of Mrs. Neal M. Carter, Mrs. C. V. Evelt, Mrs. D. C. Stuart and Mrs. A. E. Dieldal as well as Col. J. MATHESON NAMED CITY COMMISSIONER

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The city would again soon be in the frying pan. I have discussed this matter several times with the Minister of Municipal Affairs and he is of the same opinion.

"As a matter of fact, under the statutes, a mayor and council could carry out all the purposes suggested in the joint resolution of the Chamber of Commerce and the Trades and Labor Council but with safeguards. There is a special act which confers special powers upon the council of a municipality, which may delegate various powers to such official as they may appoint by a three-fourth vote of members of the council. There is no doubt that this act would substantially carry out the purposes of what is generally known as a city managership plan. So much depends upon the men who are called upon to carry out administration. I see no reason why a mayor and council should not appoint a city manager and leave him free to act just as independently as required for good administration. My mind, however, is entirely open upon the question.

After very long experience, I have come to the conclusion that a poor law well administered is better than a good law badly administered.

"With regard to the appointment of a local man as Commissioner, there has been a delay because it was necessary to look into a number of matters which in fact are indicated in the last financial statement of the City of Prince Rupert.

The provincial government has no desire to interfere with the operations of any municipality but the fact is that the municipalities find it necessary, in their own interests, from time to time to consult provincial authority.

"It has now been decided to appoint D. J. Matheson commissioner and this will be done as from June 1 next."

The baseball season will open in Prince Rupert tomorrow with a pair of all-star games between army and civilian teams, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston M. C. V. D., area commandant, will pitch the opening ball. The Army team will be paraded by the Rocky Mountain Rangers Band to the Acropolis Hill grounds and the band will be in attendance at the game.

NEW YORK, May 23: (CP)—St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers again yesterday. As a result, the Cardinals are now leading the Dodgers by one game-and-a-half in the National League pennant race.

In the American League the first place Cleveland Indians won over Washington Senators and the running-up Chicago White Sox kept three games behind with a victory over the Philadelphia Athletics. Detroit Tigers moved from fifth into third place ahead of New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox by winning over the Yanks. New York and Boston are tied for fourth place.

monwealth, as well as the steadfastness and courage of the civilian population in Great Britain, the heart of the Empire. False to the gibes of her enemies and faithful to her own glorious traditions, she has demonstrated that the metal of her sons and daughters is as true as in days of yore.

Fighting For Mankind

"But the war is not yet over and unflagging effort, self-sacrifice and endurance are still demanded of us in repelling the assault upon all that makes the life of a free people worth living.

"The British Empire is fighting not for aggrandisement or for material gain, but for its own soul and that of mankind. Its struggle will have been in vain, unless we are determined that when victory comes we will to the best of our power strive to remedy those inherent defects and social injustices which provoke strife among nations and between their fellow-citizens. Thus the peoples of the world, led by those of the Empire, will enjoy hereafter that tranquility and confident security whose only sure foundation is fair dealing between nation and nation and between man and man.

"I appeal especially to the young people of the Empire who, when the present upheaval is past, will be called upon to fashion a new world. Yours will be the task of winning the peace. Do your bit, be it great or small, to ensure that the Empire shall ever be the symbol and example of all that makes for human happiness, peace and progress. Steel your hearts and minds to the brave resolve that never again shall ruthless ambition and the cruel lust of power destroy the freedom of mankind, the peace of the home and the happiness and safety of its children.

"We have no need to be ashamed of the story of the Empire, but its greatest chapter has yet to be written, and it is for the youth of the Empire, with their boundless opportunities, buoyant hope and unshaken faith in God to write it, for the benefit of the whole human race.

"Let us remember that it is neither wealth nor might, but
