Something like 20,000 airmen will take training in the eighty-nine schools operating under the British Commonwealth Air Training plan in Canada. The total cost of the three year plan will be over \$800,000,000 with Canada's share running to more than halft a billion dollars. So successful has it been that negotiations have been proceeding to extend the three year period although the present plan does not expire upti the spring of 1943. It is a huge operation and its success has shown what can be done when there is a reasonable amount of co-operation.

Rationing Troubles - - -

Rationing is always a difficult task and we can quite understand why the federal government prefers to try the system of voluntary control before starting on the new system. In England the control system is working fairly well but it is so full of queer kinks that the life of the food control officials must be, to say the least, very difficult. When you go shopping over there you take your book of coupons with you as without it you cannot get far. If you are new to it you will find that, while there is a coupon for margarine, you can get margarine without a coupon so you use your coupon for clothes. It does not do to spend these too freely because tomorrow margarine may be ratined and as little butter can be obtained life would be rather dreary if your margarine tickets were all expend-

Eggs are rationed. If you have twenty hens you cannot eat your own eggs but, if you have only a dozen eggs and the hens lay well, you can use them all and you will be living a life of luxury until the rules are changed and they change rather often. Potatoes are not rationed but just before the new potatoes came on the market the old ones were all gone and none could be purchased.

As most people in England now have garden plots adjoining the house or in the allotment fields they provide themselves with the more common articles of diet.

In Canada we sometimes find a big jump in the price of some article. This may be for the purpose of cutting down the consumption of that article. Mutton at 35c a pound may not be used as freely as the same article at 25c except possibly in a place like Prince Rupert where most people have money with which to buy at any reasonable price.
