## RUPERT'S GLORIOUS EMPIRE DAY IS DETAILED

### IDEAL OUTING ON EMPIRE DAY AT TERRACE

With Baseball and Football, Boxing, Dancing, Rambling and Scrambling, Lunching, Laughter and Songs, a Big Party of Prince Rupert People Made Merry Holiday Yesterday

Terrace, B. C., May 24.—Queen's weather greeted the three hundred Prince Rupertites that just comfortably crowded the cars of the excursion train to Terrace today. A perfect trip along the beautiful tide water shores and up the banks of the swift Skeena, brought the pleasure seekers to the busy little town at the entrance to the Kit-sunukam Valley.

After a welcome lunch served by Boniface Gordon at the Lakelse Hotel, the crowd dispersed to seek enjoyment as they would. Some chose to linger in the shade, some to walk up the track as far as the Little Canyon, and some went down to Kitsumkalum. ### MARTIAL DRILL BY EARL GREYS

Empire Day Celebrated by Feu-de-Joie with Cheers for the King and the Royal Salute—Regiment Looked Soldierly.

Those who were out early enough yesterday morning were favored by witnessing a martial ceremonial performed by Earl Grey's Rifles which gave the necessary touch of militarism to the celebration of Empire Day in Prince Rupert, and was most effective.

At 9 a.m. the company marched out of the drill hall and formed in "company line" on the smooth surface of Second avenue, specially sprinkled by the fire department. Here a feu-de-joie was fired, three rounds of ammunition being shot into the air, followed by the royal salute and three cheers for the King.

Afterward the company marched around the parade ground and then executed the "march past" most effectively, the soldierly appearance of the regiment being remarked upon by all. Later the company took themselves to the ranges across the harbor, where a successful match was shot off with the civilian riflemen.
