All records were broken and sale proceeds were forty per cent ahead of the previous year. There was a fine display of stock from all parts of the southern interior. The proceeds of the sale were \$60,100 and the average price of beef cattle was 10.66¢ per pound. Hereford bulls sold for an average of \$284.50 and shorthorns, \$257.50.
