RACING IN THE ARGENTINE

Ten Leading Stallions Have Big Sums to Their Credit

The statistics relative to the winners of the progeny of the chief sires in Argentina have just come to hand. Of course, the figures cover the whole of last year, as there is no "close" season at Buenos Aires. Nevertheless, it is apparent that the totals appearing against the names of the two leaders, Pietremaritzburg and Jardy, are enormous, for the former is more than \$55,000 and the latter is upwards of \$35,000 in front of the English champion, Sundridge, whose total was not approached by any other stallion either on the continent or in the colonies.

The following are the records of the leading ten stallions in the Argentine in 1911, from which readers may draw their own conclusions. It is significant that the aggregate amassed by the product of these ten sires should have exceeded more than one-half of the amount offered in prizes on the British turf in 1911:

Dual Oxford-Cambridge Meet Results in Tie

Oxford and Cambridge Universities tied in the annual athletic sports, with five events each. No records were made. W. O. Ziegler of Iowa, an Oxford student, won the weight putting event, hurling the missile forty feet ten inches. Ziegler also won the hammer throw with a total distance of 139 feet, four inches. D. L. Lange of Oklahoma, like Ziegler, a Rhodes student, ran in the 100-yard event, but the best he could do was third. Duncan MacMillan, England's reliance in the coming Olympic Games at Stockholm, did the 100 in ten seconds flat, despite the fact that the track was wet with a heavy rain prevailing all the time. In the weight throw, won by Ziegler, E. P. Hubble of Chicago got third honors.
