

CAN'T BEAT THE DUTCH

For Impression Of Grit And Loyalty To Living Cause of Freedom and Nationhood See Seaman's Home

HALIFAX, Sept. 9: Dutch seamen continuing in exile their fight against Nazism, have found "a home away from home" in this cosmopolitan port.

Known as the Netherlands Seamen's Home, it is a modest brown structure situated on a tree-lined street across from the imposing residence of Nova Scotia's lieutenant governor. A flag of the Free French Netherlands is all that distinguishes it from its middle-class neighbors, but to lonesome Dutch sailors it symbolizes the land they are fighting for.

Only one of its kind in the Dominion, the Home was officially opened August 21 by Princess Juliana in a simple ceremony shorn of all royal trimmings. It was a reception in the spirit of the establishment — an informal get-together of the fighting men and their gracious heir to the throne.

Proud of the first roof they could justly call their own since the Nazi war machine rolled over the Lowlands, cheering Dutch officers and ratings jammed the dwelling the day it was opened. Many carried away patches of new paint as souvenirs of the visit.

Visitors were enthusiastically escorted through the Home by a grinning guard of honor, many of whom lapsed from halting English to an excited flow of Dutch as they attempted to show their newest possession to its best advantage.

Homey and Comfortable

Steep steps lead from the street to the Home and open on a wide hall running the length of the building. On the left is a large living room, lighted by four bay windows and joined by an archway with a commodious dining room.

Both rooms are gaily papered and tastefully furnished with comfortable studio couches, radios and lamps. One lamp, a table model, is the centre of attraction. Made from a beer bottle, it has a shade decorated with labels of practically every known brand of whiskey, gin and beer.

On the walls are pictures of the Netherlands' ruling family, with the two princesses occupying places of honor. Traced in spruce boughs are Victory V's. A poem, written in 1640, is framed on the dining room wall. Translated, it reads:

When the Hun is poor and down,
He's the humblest man in town,
But once he climbs and holds the rod,
He smites his fellow men—and God.
"That poet knows his German's" commented the officer who translated it.

Dutch Kitchen

At the end of the hallway is a kitchen, roomy and modernly equipped. Shiny pans hang from the walls while brightly colored dishes sit about on the sideboards. A large stove and table complete this culinary workshop, capable of feeding 20 or more hungry seamen.

Upstairs the bedrooms have been changed about to accommodate more than their usual quota of guests and there is room for a score or more men. A steward informed visitors the home was meant only to accommodate Dutch torpedo victims and seamen absolutely unable to find lodgings. Any of the Netherlands can drop in for a cup of tea, sandwiches or beer, he explained.

Second Crop Strawberries

Another result of the fine summer Prince Rupert is still enjoying is illustrated at H. F. Wearmouth's island farm where fine second crop strawberries are being picked. A party of visitors to Mr. Wearmouth's place Sunday had the pleasure of picking for themselves all such berries they could possibly consume.

Used Isinglass For Lost Blood

British Doctors See Possibilities In Egg Preservative

LONDON, Sept. 9: Isinglass, well known to housewives as an egg preservative, may have possibilities as a blood substitute, says the British medical journal, "Lancet."

The journal comments on research by two Toronto doctors, N. B. Taylor and E. T. Walters. "Taylor and Walters," it says "have recorded favorable results when using isinglass to replace lost blood in dogs and maintain that in many cases the dogs' lives were saved by it."

The journal says that dried human serum to great extent meets the requirements of an ideal transfusion fluid but it is not produced on a sufficiently large scale for universal use and its greatest value in burns and shocks tend to limit its use to those conditions. "The ideal," it suggests, "would be to store red cells and plasma separately so that cells only could be used for anaemia, plasma for shock and the mixture for acute haemorrhage."
