PRESIDENT SIGNS
ABOARD U. S. S. BENSON—President Roosevelt, aboard the yacht Potomac on a fishing cruise, today signed the \$7,000,000 British aid bill. The President's action makes the huge fund immediately available to establish the United States as the arsenal of nations fighting aggression.

MISSIONARIES ARRESTED
SEOUL, Korea—Fifteen British and American missionaries, including some women, have been arrested by Japanese authorities. They are alleged to have been campaigning against Japan.

LOGGER KILLED
VANCOUVER—Charles Lee, logger, was killed in the overturning of a log laden truck at Wilson Creek up the coast. Another man was injured and is in Pender Harbor Hospital.

BRAZILIAN GETS THROUGH
LISBON—A 5,000-ton Brazilian ship was attacked by Nazi planes but got through safely to a Mediterranean port. It was not damaged by bombs but a member of the crew was killed by machine-gunning.

BLAMES BRITAIN
ROME—Virginia Gayda, Fascist editor, blames Great Britain for the disappearance of the Cvetkovic government in Yugoslavia. "England is speculating in occult forces," said Gayda, condemning British intrigue.

RELIEVES PRESSURE
OTTAWA—Refitting of British ships in United States yards will relieve pressure on Canadian yards, it is stated here.

ATHLETES AT JASPER
EDMONTON—The Earl of Athol and Princess Alice, following their visit here, left today for Jasper Park where they will spend twenty-four hours before proceeding to Vancouver and Victoria.

SWIFT CURRENT WINS
VANCOUVER—Swift Current Indians went two up in the intermediate hockey series last night by defeating Nanaimo Clippers 2 to 1.

TALKING IN ENGLISH
BERLIN—Conversations between Foreign Minister Matsukata of Japan and Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany are taking place in enemy English, the only language both can talk.

BISHOP CARTER DEAD
LONDON, March 27: (CP)—Dr. William Marlborough Carter, 90, former Archbishop of Capetown, died at Bear Ash, Twyford. He was consecrated Bishop of Zululand in 1891, transferred to Pretoria in 1902 and Cape Town in 1909.

LOAD OF TROPHIES

How Local Military Boxers Cleaned Up In Vancouver Finals

Local military boxers returned yesterday from the Pacific Command boxing finals in Vancouver well burdened with trophies and medals. To the victorious champions, Lance Corporal Corner, Rocky Mountain Rangers, flyweight, and Private Cooper, Rocky Mountain Rangers, middleweight, went a gold wrist watch presented the night of the fights by Lieutenant Governor Hamber. Because the Rangers also had Private Parkinson and Corporal Porter in the finals they returned with the trophy for the best represented regiment with the highest aggregate of ten points. The trophy is a huge timepiece with a silver statue of a boxer mounted on the top.

To each of the eight boys who went south to represent this area will be presented a bronze medal and to the two champions, Corner and Cooper will go silver medals. These medals will be presented by Lieut. Col. J. E. Wood at some early date.

The two representatives of the 102nd Heavy Battery, Gunner McCabe, heavyweight, and Gunner Hunter, featherweight, were the victims of very unfortunate accidents. Hunter dislocated a vertebrae while sparring in the gym before the fight and McCabe, in the slamming of a hotel door on his hand, smashed his fingers very badly. Both these boys had to default their semi-final bouts. In fact Gunner Hunter is still in Shaughnessy Military Hospital recuperating.

In the semi-final bout, Coatsworth, R. M. R. bantamweight and Keith R. C. A. F. welterweight were eliminated from the play.

The big howl in the finals came when Parkinson, R. M. R., was decided in the lightweight section by a man whom he had battered around the ring the first round, and in the second round knocked down three times for the count of eight. The last round was very even. The crowd apparently did not like the decision for they booed heartily for a good ten minutes.

Much credit is due Lance Corporal Tommy Green, in charge of the boxers from this area. The well known civilian boxer, Hector McDonald, refereed and handled all the bouts in Vancouver.

SPORT CHAT

Sylvanus Apps, brilliant Toronto centre, defeated the same days as Nationalist government candidate in the Dominion elections, started the Leafs on the way to a 2-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings in the first National League play-off game for the Stanley Cup a year ago last night.

Reynoldstown, gallant nine-year-old Irish jumper, won his second Grand National Steeplechase victory at Aintree five years ago today. Winner in 1935, Reynoldstown became the sixth horse to win the Grand National more than once since its inauguration in 1839. There is no Grand National this year owing to the war.

AGREEMENT ON POLICE Pilot's Story Thrills Staff

New Arrangement Made Providing for Annual Payment of \$13,500 For Service

Comrades Spell-Bound With Account of Crash and Rescue After Seven-Mile Swim

A new agreement whereby the city of Prince Rupert pays \$13,500 annually to the provincial police for the policing of the city was approved by City Commissioner D. J. Matheson sitting as a city council this morning. The previous agreement provided for the city to pay \$8,248 per year to the government for policing but, as this was not meeting the actual cost of salaries, the government asked for a new agreement which did cover the salaries. Four years ago the former agreement had been reduced from \$10,000 per year.

The cost of policing compares with as high as \$16,034.92 in 1920 under the old city police system. In 1927 when the provincial force started policing the city the contract was \$10,000.

LONDON, March 27: (CP)—A 26 year-old R.A.F. pilot held 1,500 aircraft workers spell-bound—not by stunting high in the sky—but by relating an account of his fight for life after a crash.

"While making a night raid our engines conked out owing to ice," he said. "At 7,000 feet we had orders to bail out. While floating down I realized that the sea was beneath. "I must have gone down a good depth because I came up with a terrific rush and was dragged by my parachute at rapid speed. I took off my parachute and boots and began to swim. It was not until dawn that the coast was visible three quarters of a mile away. I discarded my trousers and made a last effort. Eventually soldiers hauled me on to the beach as I was too weak to help myself." He had been in the sea more than six hours and swam seven miles.
