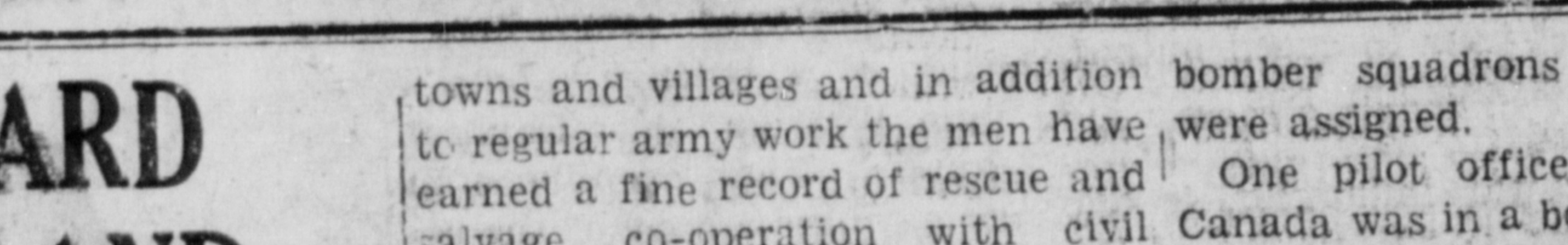

AN EAST COAST CANADIAN PORT, March 27: (CP) — They don't make a habit of crowning "Queens of the Atlantic" in time of war but, if they did, no palatial giant would draw the vote of this bustling harborfront. Your ship—they think down here—would be an unassuming, one-funnelled, sombre little craft which before the war wasn't even in the ocean-crossing class. Censorship prevents even her being named. She will never be listed in any "who's who" list of passenger boats because her interior is humbly home-like and her whole general appearance could in no way be confused with the term beautiful. Yet, come stress or storm, she has slipped across the ocean to enter this harbor with human cargo more often than any of her kind, be they bigger or smaller. Usually travelling alone, she has eluded the treacherous traps of the North Atlantic time after time to bring her passengers to these shores. # CANADA'S 50,000 GUARD BIG AREA OF ENGLAND; ON MOVE CONSTANTLY

Canadian Army Keeps Fit and Ready for Whatever May Come—Thousands More Waiting to go Over

LONDON, March 26: (CP) — Standing on guard in the defence lines of England are more than 50,000 Canadian troops while airmen of the Dominion fight in the skies and her seamen patrol the waters of the war zone. These men are part of Canada's answer to the Empire's call to arms. Thousands more are in Canada, eager to cross the Atlantic and join in the fight when the time arises.

So runs the introduction to a story written by Ross Munro, Canadian Press War correspondent, or circulation through much of the world. It was written at the request of the British Ministry of Information.

Among the places which received his outline of Canada's growing war effort were all the sister Dominions, Newfoundland, Rhodesia, the Netherland East Indies, many parts of the Near and Far East, the Scandinavian countries, Greece and the United States.

Munro related the first contingent of khaki-clad Canadians landed in the United Kingdom three months after war broke out and a steady flow of troops followed over the Atlantic. His story continued: Now in the ramparts of the island are two divisions and ancillary troops, many of them trained as well as any fighters in the world. Training is the keynote of their military life in England. Every day a brigade, a battalion or a battery is on the move somewhere, improving its tactical ability, keeping the men toughened up for the tests of mobile warfare.

**In Front Line**  
They haven't been in action yet but their keenness for battle has not dwindled or waned. Several battalions missed going to Norway by a narrow margin and a whole division was ready to move to France before the collapse, its vanguard even getting to within 40 miles of Paris. Then they settled down in those hectic months of late summer to help guard Britain against the threat of invasion.

In recent months a considerable number of Canadians have moved up to the front line, holding a certain section of the English coast. The "Canucks" took over from British units and in these positions they are patrolling broad areas with motor cycle squadrons and Bren gun carrier platoons and manning defence posts along the sea. They perform their duties with grim seriousness. This is the first touch of real soldiering for many of them.

Several times machine gunners have opened up on enemy planes and one Dornier bomber is definitely credited to a central Ontario regiment while several other units helped down other Nazi aircraft in their areas. Aiding in coastal defence are batteries of Canadian gunners. They will sweep the enemy beaches with heavy shells if an invasion is attempted.

**Rescue Work**  
The First Division, under command of Maj.-Gen. G. R. Pearkes V.C., is billeted in scores of little

towns and villages and in addition to regular army work the men have earned a fine record of rescue and salvage, co-operation with civil workers after bombing attacks. This has all helped to cement the good relations existing between English civilians and the Canadian fighting men. Members of the Royal Canadian Engineers have earned the new British awards, the George Cross and the George Medal, for unusual courage. The tedium involved in continuous rehearsals of tactics and moves has not dulled their vigorous spirit. They think primarily of the day when they will meet the Hun. With their fine equipment and guns and their fighting zeal they will carry on the high tradition of the Canadian army set by their fathers in the First Great War.

English hospitality has helped ease the weight of training and the army itself has launched educational and entertainment schemes to help keep the men in good spirits. The YMCA has provided a hockey rink for use of Canadian troops. A hockey league has been formed with about 100 teams entered and soccer and softball also have been played on a league basis in every camp.

**Good Officers**  
The Canadian headquarters staff is taking great pains to obtain qualified officers and a Canadian officers' cadet training unit is operating in Southern England. A Canadian staff course has been started where officers of all ranks from overseas units will receive instruction in army administration and staff duties. More than 50 officers started the first course early in 1941 and are hard at work in the old manor house where the college is located.

The forces from the Dominion are trained and equipped after the British army fashion but in addition have made innovations and adaptations that have produced unusually good results. With the Canadian-British corps is a road building company of the Royal Canadian Engineers that has done some remarkable highway work in England already and a tunnelling company of the Engineers has labored for months on secret defence works.

The record of the tunnelling company so impressed the war office that a detachment was sent to Gibraltar and now miners from Canada are drilling and tunnelling on the Rock, improving the defences.

**Air Support**  
Supporting the army in England is the R.C.A.F. army co-operation squadron which has developed a new wireless apparatus for ground-to-air communication that may revolutionize army co-operation operations. A Canadian fighter squadron has been in action against the Germans and a second army co-op squadron is being converted into a fighter.

First graduates of the Empire Air Training Plan have reached England and these Canadians have flown over enemy territory with
