British and Greek Undersea Craft Taking Big Bags in Italy's Own Waters

SPLIT, YugoSlavia, Feb. 3: (CP) -A concerted British and Greek submarine campaign against Italian military supply routes deep in the Adriatic Sea was indicated today by reports that seven Italian vessels had been sunk recently. Travelers reported that a submarine today sank the Italian freighter Vittorio Benito of about 5,000 tons and another unidentified 6,000-ton Italian vessel.

A single Greek submarine of only 570 tons is credited with sinking 40,000 tons of Fascist shipping including a 10,000 ton troopship in convoy at the week-
