## LANDINGS DECREASE

### Halibut Fares Here In April Some Half Million Pounds Less Than Year Ago

Halibut landings at the port of  
Prince Rupert for the month of  
April this year totalled 2,070,000  
pounds as compared with 2,621,000  
pounds in the same month last  
year, according to waterfront com-  
piled figures. The American land-  
ings for this April amounted to  
1,025,500 pounds as compared with  
1,440,000 pounds last year in April  
while the Canadian total was  
1,044,500 pounds as against 1,440,-  
000 pounds.

ing service and election.
