HIDEOUS DEED LADYSMITH

Crazed Husband After Separation from Young Wife Returns to Shoot Her and Attempts the Life of His Own Child.

(Special to Daily News.)
Ladysmith, May 30—The town was thrown into a frenzy of excitement last night at eleven o'clock by an attempted triple murder and suicide. The perpetrator of the deed, Joseph Allsoph, has been married less than two years, but was separated from his young wife. Allsoph returned from Vancouver tonight, and immediately went to the home of his mother-in-law, and fired two bullets at the breast of his wife then at Mrs. Hutchinson, and at his own baby. He missed the latter, but then fired two shots into his own body. The assassin will die, also his wife. Allsoph, who is believed to be insane, attempted suicide two months ago.

NEW WORLD'S RECORDS MADE

Athletes Achieve Splendid Feats at Trials for Coming Pacific Coast Olympic Games—Long Leap and Shot Put.

Stanford University, May 25.—Two world's records were broken, two Olympic records were tied and still another Olympic record was approached within one-fifth of a second at the Pacific Coast Olympic trials on the Stanford oval.

Torine, of the Olympic Club of San Francisco, set a new mark of 6 feet 7 inches in the running high jump, 7-8 of an inch better than his own world's record. Ralph Rose, Olympic Club, made a new world's record in the shot put of 89 feet 63-8 inches, right and left aggregate. Rose also set an Olympic record of 49 feet 2 1-4 inches for the right hand and increased this to 49 feet 7 1-8 inches.

HEART STRIKE

Coshocton, Ohio, May 29.—Sympathy for the mine mules has caused 75 men of the Morgan Run Colliery to go on strike. The men stated that they did not think the mules received proper treatment, and say they will remain on strike until assured the mules will be humanely treated.

SWEDISH OLYMPIAD

American Athletes to Doll Up for Great International Contest.

In order to distinguish American athletes who represent this country at the Olympic games from those of other countries while in Sweden next summer, the American Olympic committee has decided on a special uniform for its representatives. All Americans will wear a white jacket, white cap and white trunks, with a red, white and blue stripe down each side. On the jacket and cap there will be a large American shield.

So that the uniforms will fit, the managers of the different tryouts, which will be held on June 8th, at Cambridge, Chicago and San Francisco, have been instructed by the committee to have each athlete who enters state on his entry blank the size of the cap, jacket and trunks he might have to use.
