## Turkey Leftovers

How to use those turkey leftovers is sometimes a problem but Laura Pepper, chief of the consumer section of the Agriculture Department, has just the recipe to fill the bill—a turkey and macaroni casserole. Take 1/4 cup fat, 3/4 cup hot milk, 2 eggs, beaten, 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 1/2 cups diced, cooked turkey or chicken, 2 teaspoons minced parsley, 2 teaspoons minced onion, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 1 cup cooked macaroni, salt and pepper. Add fat to hot milk and pour slowly over beaten eggs, add remaining ingredients and season with salt and pepper to taste. Pour into a greased baking dish and bake in a 350 degree oven until firm, 20-30 minutes. May be served with mushroom sauce.

## Carrot

If you are looking for a fresh idea to add to your holiday meals, Marion Harlow of Nutrition Services suggests that you add crisp, raw carrot sticks to the dish of celery curls and other relishes. They will increase your quota of vitamin A which not only helps to prevent night blindness but increases resistance to infection.

## Make-overs

Now is the time to get your sewing machine out and use your native ingenuity in remodelling your old clothes instead of buying new ones, in the opinion of J. A. Klein, Prices Board administrator of women's, misses' and children's clothing. He says: "We don't want the women of Canada to buy anything they can possibly do without. Let us make our clothes go as far as possible."

## Furniture

Here are some tips from the consumer section of the Prices Board for keeping your furniture in good condition. Rub it with plenty of oil or polish, one part turpentine, two parts boiled linseed oil, for example. White spots on wood come off when rubbed with spirits of camphor or peppermint. Strong sun causes the varnish to crack so pull the blinds. Excessive dryness is hard on furniture. Do not place your precious pieces against the radiator or over hot-air register.

## Cutlery

There is no likelihood that chopsticks will be our lot before the war is over but Canadian housewives will have to get along with the silver they have, says Byrne Sanders, "Mrs. Consumer" of the Prices Board. Patriotic housewives will do with the number they have been accustomed to use at the summer cottage. The "dressed-up" table is likely to be a special occasion affair she says, with the

manufacture of cutlery simplified after December 31.

## Blinds

To wash roller blinds the experts advise you to place the blind over a wooden table, brush lightly to remove surface dirt, prepare a basin of warm soapy water in which a tablespoon of borax has been dissolved, moisten the blind and scrub gently using a soft nail brush. Then rinse with plenty of warm water, turn the blind and rinse the other side, squeeze out as much water as possible by rubbing a clean towel over it, leave to dry on table until three parts dry and then iron. Do not use borax on colored blinds.

Woodsworth, leader and founder of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, member for Winnipeg North Centre; and Dr. H. R. Fleming, Liberal member for Humboldt since 1935. In addition War Services Minister Thorson resigned from Selkirk riding to become president of the exchequer court and Thomas Vlen, Liberal member for Montreal Outremont and deputy speaker of the House, resigned to take a Senate seat.

Seven by-elections in 1942 brought one less to the government but it was in a riding in which no government-endorsed candidate was running, Charlevoix-Saguenay, the Quebec seat held by former State Secretary Casgrain who left it to take a bench appointment, went to an independent candidate in a by-election November 30.

In two other by-elections held that day Winnipeg North Centre was retained by the C. C. F. and War Services Minister LaFleche won in Outremont.

Earlier in the year Justice Minister St. Laurent was elected in Quebec South, the seat held by his predecessor in office; Labor Minister Mitchell won Welland, a former Liberal riding; and a Liberal candidate, Dr. G. Fauteux, retained Montreal St. Mary's for the party.

The government did not oppose Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, National Conservative leader who contested York North where the sitting Conservative member, Lt.-Col. Alan Cockeram, resigned to make way for his leader, but Mr. Meighen, supported by Premier Hepburn, was defeated by J. W. Noseworthy, C.C.F.

There now are two House vacancies, Humboldt and Selkirk, and one pending as a result of a supreme court judgment supporting a conviction of violation of the Elections Act against R. G. Davidson, Liberal member for Stanstead.

The year brought changes in the Senate where at one time there were 16 vacancies, six of them caused by deaths in 1942. New appointments were Thomas Vlen, W. Rupert Davies, publisher of the Kingston Whig-Standard and former president of The Canadian Press, P. R. DuTremblay, publisher of LaPresse de Montreal, and Joseph Bench, K.C., of St. Catharines, Ontario. The senate standing on November 30 was: Liberals 47, Conservatives 38, Vacant 11.

## New Party Leaders

M. J. Coldwell, M. P. for Rose-town-Biggan, Saskatchewan, was elected leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation on July 29, succeeding the late J. S. Woodsworth. On December 11 the National Conservative convention at Win-

nipeg elected Premier John Bracken of Manitoba leader of the party and changed the name of the organization to "Progressive Conservative." Mr. Bracken succeeded Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, former prime minister, who retired from the leadership.
