DEATH PREFERABLE

Prisoners Enter Into Pact Because of Food Served Them.

Omaha, Neb., May 31.—Eleven prisoners in the county jail this morning entered into a suicide compact and attempted to kill themselves by turning on the gas.

When a jailer discovered them James Highley, serving a 60 day sentence, was nearly dead, and George Stevens and Barney Kemmel were in a critical condition. Highley was rushed to the county hospital. He will live. Stevens and Kemmel soon recovered under treatment at the jail. The other eight prisoners yielded promptly to treatment.

When discovered the eleven men were sitting huddled together about three open gas jets. They confessed the suicide agreement and blamed the jail food.

HARBOUR FOR TRIPOLI

Canadian Company Gets Contract for Lighthouse Work.

The British acting consul general at Tripoli, Mr. G. H. Fitzmaurice, reports that the contract for the construction work has been awarded to the Italian firm Almagia. The harbor, when completed, will be nearly double the size of the port of Genoa, and will be one of the largest in the Mediterranean. By reason of the congestion of the port, caused by the presence of transports and other steamers conveying military stores, the governor general found it necessary to issue an ordinance limiting after February 15th the maximum discharge of cargo from steamers to 150 tons each vessel. A new lighthouse is being constructed at the port by a Canadian company.
