Japanese Claim to Have Already Entered City-Sudden Change Made in Command of Allied Naval Forces—Dutchman Takes Over.

LONDON, Feb. 11: (CP) - Tokyo headquarters claimed today that Japanese troops had entered "the city area of Singapore" at 8 a.m. local time but, with a population of more than 750,000, "the city area extends four or five miles from the centre of Singapore." Meanwhile a change was announced in the Allied High Command in

the southwest Pacific with Admiral Thomas Hart, United States Asiatic commander, relieved of his post as commander-in-chief of PACIFIC Allied naval forces in the area because of ill-health. He is succeeded by Vice-Admiral Helfrich of the Royal Netherlands Navy.
