### From The Waterfront

On a regularly scheduled voyage to Alaska, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock yesterday morning from Vancouver and sailed at 10:30 a.m. for Skagway. The vessel had on board 152 passengers of whom five disembarked here while two took passage from Prince Rupert for the north aboard her.

The order of Great Britain for 1,600,000 cases of canned herring from the coast, in the filling of which the local cannery is among the coast plants contributing, is now within 100,000 cases of being met and should be filled, it is expected, by the time fishing closes on March 10 unless the run should fail altogether within the coming week.

Skipper W. E. Eccles, former well known officer of Canadian National Steamships, now in the naval service, arrived in the city on the Catala this morning from Esquimalt to be stationed out of here.

Having been delayed by heavy freight traffic for waypoints, Union steamer Catala, Capt. Harry MacLean, did not arrive in port until 11 o'clock this morning from the south and is to sail at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Port Simpson and Stewart whence she is due back here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship liner Northland arrived in port at 9:45 this morning from Alaska and, after discharging fish for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways, sailed this afternoon in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

## Alaska Road

### Is Not Needed

Such Is Opinion of Correspondent to Vancouver Sun.

A correspondent to the Vancouver Sun urges that adequate protection of Prince Rupert and Squamish is more essential to defence of the west from Japanese invasion than would be a road to Alaska. The more roads there are, the more they would help an invader, he declares.

The correspondent says: "The fact is we already have an interior route to Alaska. There is a railroad to the door of Alaska at Prince Rupert, a modern port one hundred miles away from the open sea, then protected waterway to Skagway, railway to Whitehorse and water navigation in summer and stage road in winter to Dawson and interior Alaska points."

## Camp Buildings

### For Japanese

#### Being Erected

JASPER, March 2: — Board frameworks, over which tents will be pitched, have been constructed to accommodate Japanese who will be engaged in roadwork from various points in this area. Meanwhile such Japanese as have already arrived are being accommodated in bunk cars spotted at various sidings between here and Red Pass Junction.

The first hundred Japanese from the coast arrived Tuesday at Rainbow and Lucerne, points near the Alberta boundary to work on the uncompleted road between Jasper and Red Pass.

## New or Additional

### COST OF LIVING BONUS

#### Prohibited Without Permission

Order of National War Labour Board to Employers and Employees:

An employer who was not paying his employees a cost of living bonus prior to February 15, 1942, may not start to pay such a bonus on or after that date, nor may an employer who has been paying such a bonus now increase it unless he has specific permission from a War Labour Board.

Whether in the future a bonus may be paid or changed in amount will depend on the National War Labour Board's announcement in May 1942, with respect to any change in the cost of living index between October 1941, and April 1942, unless in a particular case a War Labour Board has given specific permission to do otherwise.
