

NEWS OF NORWAY

Since Quisling came to the helm in Norway some rather odious laws have been enacted. One will compel all Norwegian boys and girls between 10 and 18 years inclusive to enrol "for active service" in the Quisling-sponsored "youth organization." This law, enacted at the first session of the Quisling government, becomes effective March 1.

Another new law compels all public school teachers to join the Nazi-controlled Norwegian Teachers' Union.

One of these laws requires all persons desiring to engage in publishing to join the Nazi-controlled Norwegian Publishers' Association and still another restricts the placing of memorials on the graves of Norwegian war heroes.

BASKETBALL PROGRESS AT SIMPSON

Savoys Beat Athletic Club And Return Game Will Be Played Here

Port Simpson Athletic Club's senior basketball team will visit Prince Rupert in the near future to avenge a defeat they received at the hands of a fast and younger Savoys team Saturday night at Simpson. The Savoys, carrying Ted Arney, Alex Bill and Don MacDonald from the Intermediate ranks, eked out a 56 to 54 verdict in a close finish that nearly saw Simpson pull the game out of the fire.

Savoys were leading by 14 points a nice margin, at the halfway mark. Angus MacPhee was replaced by MacDonald but this proved a little too risky and, after the Simpson lads had picked up three fast baskets, Mac came in to steady Savoys up a little.

The star of the game was Oliver Adams who learned his basketball at Sardis and his co-star was young Ted Arney. With Arney, Adams and Gar Taylor on the forward line and the veterans Beynon and MacPhee at guard, the city lads were just a little too much for the homesters. With Angus MacPhee banished on personal and Adams firing a little the Simpsonites acquired some new life in the last quarter but they failed to overcome the lead piled up by the first string Savoys and breasted the tape four points down.

Under agreement the Simpson team was to be entertained here only if it beat the locals or came within 6 points of them. They beat the six point margin so will show here soon.

Further Support of Authorities Sought by Local Organization

The need for more active support from the various authorities—city, provincial and Dominion—in the providing of necessary supplies and financial assistance to get work done was one of the matters discussed at the regular weekly meeting of the executive of the Prince Rupert Civilian Protection Organization (A.R.P.) at the week-end.

In connection with the digging of water holes in the city, it was reported this was being proceeded with and coverings for these were being built. The support of the city was very gratifying. The possibility of having adequate fire protection along the waterfront was being taken up and inquiries were being made with the view of having a fireboat equipped.

Representations are being made to have a fully prepared emergency hospital reception room ready. The health department under Arnold Playton, will try to get action in this connection. The assistance of the Canadian Red Cross in providing supplies and making arrangements for food supplies and extra clothing were being pushed with vigor.

The need for greater water connection with the dry dock was considered. Camouflaging of oil tanks was being planned.

The activities of the district wardens were very pleasing, it was reported. These people, with their police wardens, were continuing the listing of occupants of houses, the equipment available in the homes, nearest fire hydrants and alarm boxes. Some of the wardens had large-scale street maps made out and on these were marked all necessary and helpful information. There is still a great need for more voluntary workers.

Letters will be sent to T. D. Pettullo, representative in the provincial legislature, and to Olof Hanson, representative in the federal house, urging the need for immediate and complete recognition of the local situation and provision of necessary funds and help to have the work done.

In the absence of J. J. Little, the chair was taken by H. T. Lock. Others present were Inspector Ernest Gammon, J. S. Wilson, A. Flaten, E. J. Fitzpatrick and Wm. Lambie.

NEW HOUSES ARE OPENED

Excellent Accommodation Is Provided For Dry Dock Workers—City Commissioner Officials At Inaugural

There was a considerable gathering of citizens at Hays Cove Circle Saturday afternoon to attend the official opening by City Commissioner D. J. Matheson of the spacious dining hall and two commodious staff houses which have been erected by Wartime Housing Limited for the accommodation of employees of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock. The visitors were given full opportunity to inspect the new buildings regarding which numerous complimentary remarks were heard. Following the opening proceedings, refreshments were served to the callers.

In declaring the building open, Mr. Matheson described them as a credit to the city. The program of Wartime Housing Ltd. here would do much to relieve the acute housing shortage which had developed owing to industrial expansion. With 151 houses included in the present program, 65 being already completed and occupied, the City Commissioner stated that he had been given assurance, that, if more houses were required for the war industrial workers here, they would be provided. Incidentally, he revealed that some \$4000 per year taxes was being derived from Wartime Housing Ltd. as a result of the erection of the new buildings. Mr. Matheson gave some statistics of Wartime Housing Ltd. construction activities involving construction throughout the Dominion amounting to \$17,000,000.

T. W. Boulter, dry dock superintendent, introduced Mr. Matheson and W. F. Eve, administrator here for Wartime Housing Limited, was in charge of the opening proceedings. Miss Bernice Eastwood, president at the piano for the singing of "O Canada" and "God Save the King."

The opening ceremonies took place in the large dining hall which measures 108 by 50 feet and contains fifty tables—providing seating accommodation for two hundred men. The dining hall will be operated cafeteria style, the concession being in the hands of the Sunrise Grocery interests.

The splendidly appointed kitchen was of particular interest to the lady visitors at the opening. The equipment for the storage, handling and preparation of food as well as the victualling utensils is completely modern and efficient. The furnishings are substantial and attractive.

Each of the two staff or lodging houses contains fifty-two rooms, some double and some single, each having accommodation for 93 men. Bedroom furnishings consist of single beds, table, chair and cupboard. Single rooms are 8 by 12 feet and double rooms twelve feet square. Each staff house has comfortable lounge and
