On the other hand, strangely enough, the survey showed a tendency for children who had rheumitism and cerebral spinal meningitis to be slightly taller and heavier than other children but the number of these cases available for study was small.

No significant difference was found between the average child who had suffered from measles. whooping cough, chicken pox, German measles, scarlet fever or mumps in comparison with children who had not. The only diseases which seemed to affect statureand these only slightly-were dip-

theria and smallpox. Of 39,550 boys examined during the survey, 27,902 had suffered from at least one of the so-called ordinary diseases, and 27,271 of the 38,503 girls had suffered from

Physical defects-including ab normal tonsils, enlarged glands, malnutrition, nervous disorders, ear defects, pulmonary disease and the like-were more closely related to the child's stature than
