Timely Recipes

BAKING POWDER BISCUITS
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
4 tablespoons butter or other shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt
2-3 cup milk (about)
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening; add milk gradually until soft dough is formed. Roll 1/2-inch thick on slightly floured board. Cut with floured biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.), 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 12 biscuits.
