This cases for those in business to replace stocks upon which they had established their basic prices a costs which will show them a reasonable profit, because their selling prices were established on costs of merchandise bought prior to the basic period. 

2 tablespoons minced onion 1 stalk celery

1 tablespoon butter or other fat 2 cups milk Salt pepper and any other de-

sired seasoning. Soak lima beans in water over-

night. Add onion and celery and soak until soft. This takes from 1/2 to 3/4 of an hour. Heat milk in double boiler, add butter, salt, pepper and any other seasoning desired. Force the beans, onions

and celery through the sieve add to the hot milk. Stir w thoroughly heated and well blen ed. Garnish with chopped pus
