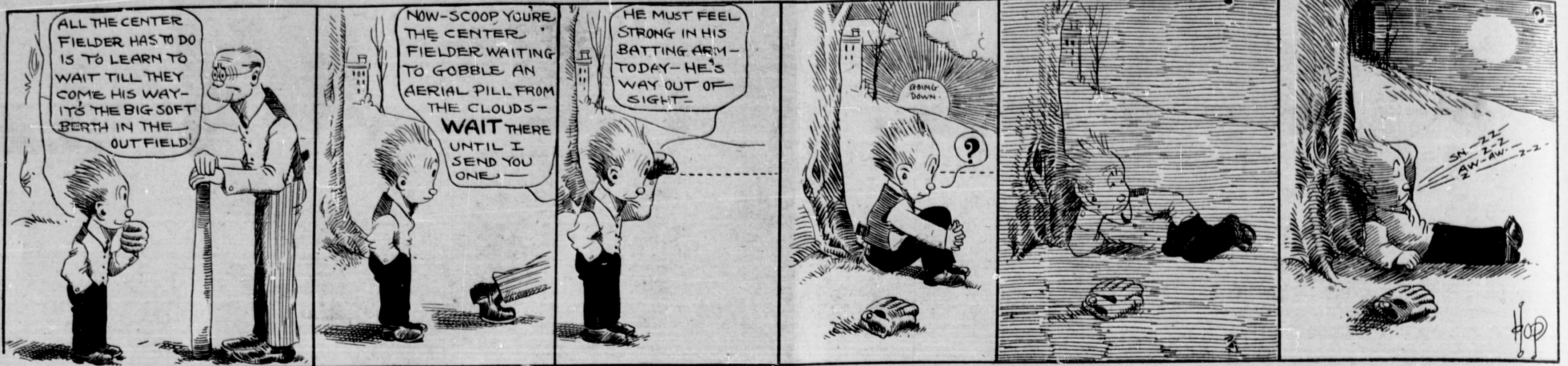

### MISSION WORK IN PROVINCE

(Continued from Page 1.)

"The reports of the Immigration Bureau point to the fact that British Columbia looms largely in the minds of intending settlers. For the year 1901 the number of settlers entering Canada, destined for British Columbia, was 2,600. For the year 1911 it was 51,689, a great increase in ten years. It is easily to be seen that this ratio will increase rather than diminish. Added to these there is the new interest that is being taken in the rich fishing industry in the waters of the Pacific. To meet these requirements an added force is being secured to do the work, which until lately has been done by Mr. McAulay, among the loggers only. It is proposed to appoint two men, one a medical missionary and the other an ordained missionary, to carry on this work on institutional lines, establishing libraries, reading rooms and conducting night classes where opportunity offers.

"Owing to the general physical features of the country, valleys separated by high mountains, and the great area now being opened up to the settler, the population of these newer districts must be sparsely distributed until the local industries are established. This will render missionary work not only more difficult, but also more costly.

"It is a peculiar characteristic of a new country that the rougher its physical features and the more dangerous its occupation, the more indifferent the people are to religious things, and the more open and flagrant the vices. This is true of British Columbia. There is, therefore, the greater necessity of the church, with her high moral standard and positive message of salvation, strongly entrenched herself on the frontier, that lawlessness and lust may not go unchecked in a land wherein God has placed marvelous riches, and which He has fashioned in unexcelled beauty."

Why should the public want to pay extra profit to the hotel keeper?

To my way of thinking there is no comparison between a place where a man can stand by a bar for hours and treat his friends, thereby spending his money and degrading his intellect and a bottle shop where a man makes his purchase and retires to his home. It is possible that the hotel keeper is given the preference and that these women who signed the petition are not considered earnest thinking women but obstacles preventing reforms.

### THEY GET WELL ALL THE SAME

Nature is Kind to Surgeons Who Make Mistakes and Leave Forceps and Wash Basins in Your Anatomy.

Atlantic City, June 12.—Reports of pieces of gauze and sponge left in persons after operations were made at the meeting of the surgical section of the American Medical Association which is meeting here. Dr. Ingersoll Olmstead of Hamilton, Ont., startled the surgeons with an account of some surgery that showed how the carelessness of the operator had not resulted fatally merely because nature had happily stepped in.

Dr. Olmstead reported three cases, the third of which was a man of prominence in the Canadian government. He had been treated at a prominent medical institution in Toronto and one of the surgeons of that hospital had operated on him for the relief of his symptoms. After the operation the patient did not improve, but developed a tumor which could not be explained. After an X-ray examination Dr. Olmstead advised an operation. As soon as the abdominal cavity was opened the tumor was exposed and when it was excised it was found to contain a sponge that would soon have developed poisoning had it not been removed.
