Budapest, Capital of Hungary, Gets Its First Strafing-Both Britain and Russia Active

LONDON, Sept. 5 (CP)-British and Russian airmen administered a punishing whipsaw assault upon Germany from west and east last night. A strong force of the Royal Air Force kindled big fires in Bremen and the Russians scattered bombs over eastern Germany and occupied Poland. Eleven planes were lost by the Royal

Air Force in last night's raids: Unidentified Allied raiders made their first attack upon Budapest, the capital of Hungary.

REPULSED A German war bulletin, which reported the raids on eastern Germany, did not name the cities attacked but the British Broadcasting Corporation quoted Scandinavian dispatches from Berlin as saying the targets included Vienna, Koenigsburg and Breslau.

Berlin broadcast an official Hungarian announcement that Budapest and points in northern Hungary were hit by bombs.
