Tommy Burns, born Noah Brusso at Hanover, Ont., June 17, 1881, won a 20-round decision from Marvin Hart in San Francisco Feb. 23, 1906, and held the title till Christmas Day, 1908, when Jack Johnson in Sydney, N.S.W. whipped Burns so terrifically that police jumped in and stop-87 | ped the fight in the 14th round. one would never guess that the 34 portly, bespectacled, soft-spoken, 824 smiling 220-pounder behind the beer taps was 60 years old last 59 June 17. And one would never 186 guess that at five feet 61/2 inches 210 and 170 pounds he was one of the lightest men ever to hold the 282 heavyweight crown.

Then, with himself as his own manager-he never hired a pilot-Burns defended his crown 14 times in two years and 10 months, fighting in England, Ireland, France, the United States, Australia and New


