Lieut.-Gen. McNaughton Inspects C.P.R. Tanks



THE stepped-up tempo of tank production at Angus Shops, Montreal, was evident everywhere when Lieut.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton made a detailed inspection of the big Canadian Pacific plant, whose machinery is turning out increasing numbers of medium weight "Valentines" for the armed forces. Accompanied by ranking officials of the Canadian Army and senior officers of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Canada's No. 1, Lieut.-Gen. McNaughton, who received a first hand picture of tank construction from the smallest parts to the finished product. He displayed keen interest in the construction of the speedy war machines, a type that has been highly praised by the Russians on the field of battle. Highlight of General McNaughton's visit followed the shops inspection when six of the khaki-painted "Valentine" tanks, fresh from the Angus shops assembly line, raced out on the shops midway, where they wheeled, plumed, and went through various other tactics to show their manoeuvrability. HOUSEWIVES PLAY PART

Canada's Women Anxious To Co-operate in Every Way to Win War.

By PATRICIA CONNOLLEY Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, March 3: — Laura Pepper, chief of the consumer section, Department of Agriculture, says the Canadian housewife isn't fooling in her effort to win the war from the kitchen. "An analysis of any day's mail received by the consumer section will vouch for that," she told The Canadian Press.

Since sugar rationing came into effect, Miss Pepper said, the majority of queries have been regarding the use of sugar substitutes. "The general desire in all these letters," she said, "has been to co-operate with the sugar rationing. There have been no complaints about restrictions. Neither are women worried over possible lack of supplies."

As further evidence of a desire to take their place on the home front, Miss Pepper said Canadian housewives have become vitamin conscious. Here are typical queries:

- (a) What Canadian foods can I use in order to maintain food nutrition?
- (b) What is the difference in composition and food value of homogenized milk, chocolate milk and evaporated and condensed milk?
- (c) What is the difference in food value of the three grades of butter?

Here's the Answers To these queries the consumer section through promptly forwarding copies of their various bulletins on Canadian foods would reply:

- (a) Cereals, eggs, beets, fruit

and vegetables are among the Canadian foods that can be used to maintain good nutrition.

(b) Homogenized is specially processed to keep the cream throughout the milk and is therefore of superior quality; chocolate milk is skim milk with added chocolate syrup; evaporated milk if diluted according to directions of the manufacturer is equivalent to whole milk.

(c) The difference between first, second and third grade butter is in the flavor and texture, all three grades possess the same amount of butter fat and moisture.

"The need for economy in wartime is also making the average wife much more price conscious," Miss Pepper said. "They are thinking of price in relation to quality, they ask for more factual information in their daily marketing—and we think the Canadian policy of quality production and grade labeling is paying dividends."

SWEDISH MEAT CROQUONS
1 pound round steak, very fine
2 tablespoons butter
onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cups milk
2 eggs (beaten slightly)
4 cups corn flakes
1 cup milk (for greasing)
Put meat in bowl and add salt, pepper, milk and eggs. Roll corn flakes into crumb to meat mixture. Mix thoroughly and form into balls. Fry slowly in butter.
Yield: 12 small meatballs to 5 servings
