VANCOUVER, Dec. 19 - Christmas shoppers who may think that Columbia, this 28th day of November the order limiting retail deliveries will be relaxed this season are due

for disappointment. James Stewart, services administrator for the Wartimes Prices and Trade Board, states that the order setting deliveries to one a day will PRINCE RUPERT be enforced during the Christmas shopping period.

"This Christmas will not be like the old peaceful holiday of prewar days," says Mr. Stewart. "Labor, gasoline, rubber and vehicles are vitally needed for the armed services and war industries and

must be conserved." The board advises Christmas shoppers to carry as many parcels as they can in order to avoid overtaxing the one-a-day delivery facilities permitted under the regula-


