EDITORIAL

New Employment Regulations . . .

The new federal employment regulations are designed, apparently, to have more of a stabilizing than a freezing effect. One of the most important results will be that of checking the drift of labor from one job to an- munication. other. The permits henceforth to be issued by the selective service offices in connection with the changing of jebs will perform a valuable function in this regard.

Not much compulsion has yet been introduced insofar as the jobs themselves are concerned although it becomes mandatory to report when changes are being made. The check thus obtained will make it more feasible to apply the compulsion when the time for it arrives.

The newspapers stand to lose some revenue to their classified columns as a result of the orders affecting job advertisng.

Easier than we had expected may be said of the new employment regulations but, like the baby, they will soon be cutting their teeth no doubt.

Cost of Living Bonus . . .

Canada's price ceiling has bulged upwards recently, under the pressure of rising beef, potato and other prices, and as a result the National War Labor Board has ordered adjustments of the cost of living bonus.

Unofficial estimates figure that about \$1,000,000 a week has been added to the nation's pay envelopes in the form of new bonus payments and bonus adjustments, starting August 15.

A 2.4 percent rise in the living cost index since last October, as computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, is responsible for the adjusted bonus. Those employers who have already been paying a bonus of \$3.65 per week will have to up that figure by 60 cents in most cases. Most employers who have not been paying a bonus will have to start paying one.

The adjusted bonus is not to exceed, according to official orders, \$4.25 a week or 17 per cent of the basic salary of any employee.

Of course, all this is added to the overhead of being in business.


