SPEAKS ON ISRAELISM

P. H. Linzey Addresses Meeting of Local Toc H Society. The world is now at the end of one age—that of the Babylonian dispensation—and on the threshold of another in which there will be peace and rule in accordance with the law of God, P. H. Linzey declared in the course of an address on "British Israelism and the Signs of the Times" before the regular weekly meeting of Toc H this week. Harold Hampton was in the chair and there was an audience of some thirty persons. Mr. Linzey reminded the audience of how Old Testament and Biblical prophecy had been literally fulfilled over and over again. He instanced the Babylonian captivity and the fall of Babylon, the promise to Abraham that his seed would become a great nation and the overthrow of the Persian Empire by Alexander the Great. From these facts he inferred that Biblical Prophecy was literally true and that all prophecies that had not yet been fulfilled would in God's good time duly come to pass. The Anglo-Saxon race, declared the speaker, was chosen to be a special instrument for the fulfillment of God's purposes. "The Israel of God," who were not necessarily Jews, were not chosen because they deserved the honor but because they had certain gifts and characteristics which made them suitable. Mr. Linzey told his audience that there would be much to suffer and endure before Anglo-Sax-
