The Duration Of The War...

Germany and Japan cannot win the war, for they are losing the race of war production.

Even considering our serious transportation problem, it still is not entirely impossible that the war with Germany might end in 1943. However, some time in 1944 will continue as a more likely "first" date unless the military news the rest of the summer is unbelievably good.

A real second front on the continent depends on what is now the worst bottleneck—shipping. In the meantime, increasingly heavy bombing and commando raids will serve a part of the purpose of a second front, and will pave the way for an invasion at a later date when the chances are improved.

There have been sufficient real improvements during the past year so that there is now less excuse than ever for being falsely optimistic about the nearby development of the war. Until American mass producton of weapons got under way, until lease-lend aid to Britain and Russia began to flow in large quantities, until fairsized bodies of troops were landed in Australia with adequate bombers and fighting planes, until Madagascar was occupied, there were grounds for fearing that Germany, or Japan might succeed in occupying one or all of Great Editor.
