CASUALTIES OF DIEPPE ANNOUNCED

Brigadier Southam is Among Missing-Tales of Heroism Like Days of Vimy

OTTAWA, August 22: (P)-Brigadier W. W. Southam of Toronto, one of the officers commanding troops taking part in the Dieppe raid this week, is missing as a result of the action, his family was notified today.

In the second casualty list issued since the Battle of Dieppe, seventy additional names were added today to those announced, last night as among killed, wounded and missing in the hectic fighting of Canadian troops on the French coast. The total for the two lists now stands at forty-eight killed, 23 missing and 43 wounded. Other lists will come later.

The city of Hamilton, represented in the Dieppe battle by the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry, was more heavily represented in last night's and today's lists than any other centre.



PEARL HARBOR, August 22 (P) -United States Marines stood fast in hard-won positions in the Solowhich tried a stealthy night landing to pierce the American lines.
