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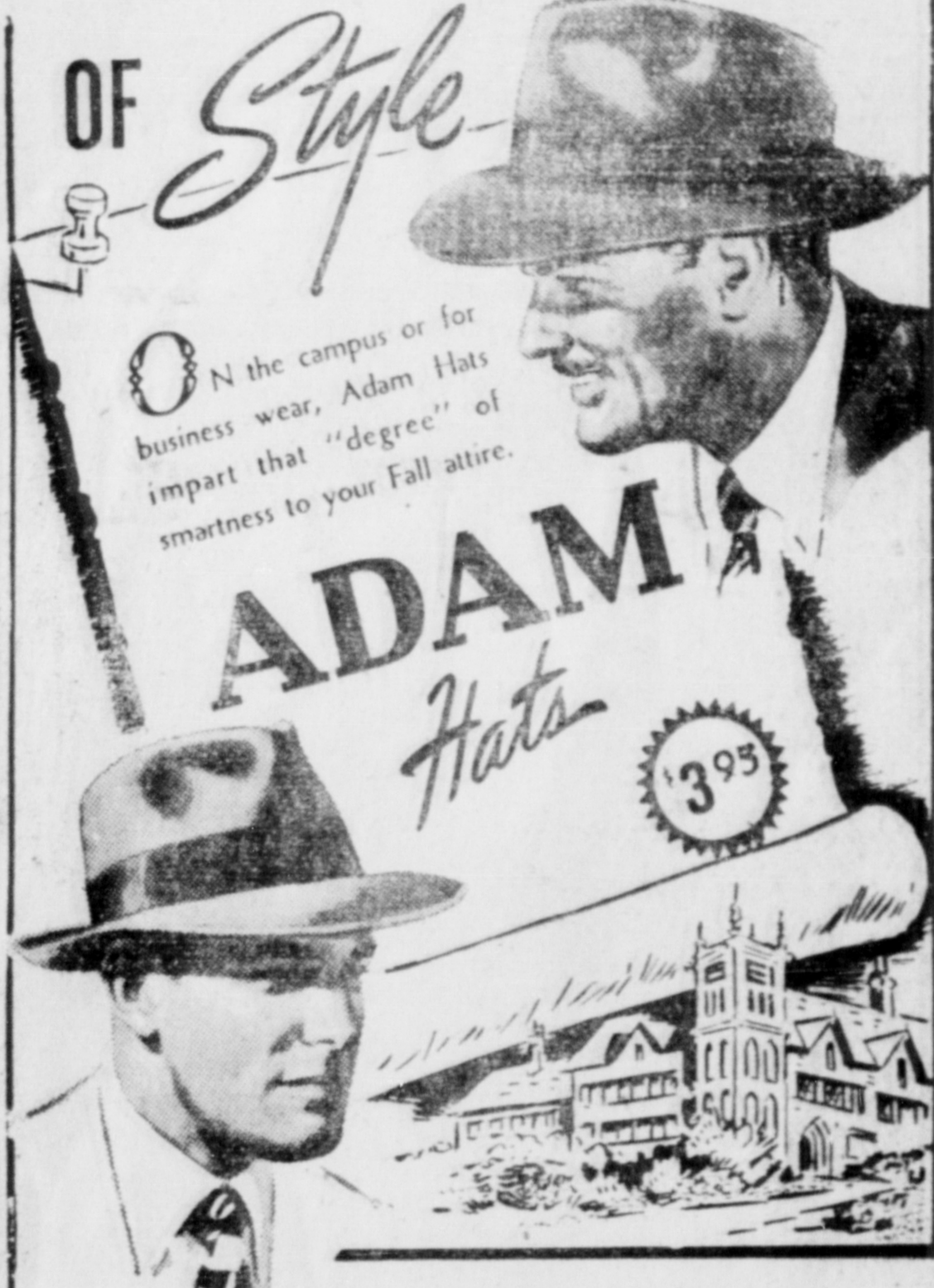

SOLDIERS SHOWMEN

Units in Canada Being Canvassed
For Entertainment Talent

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—Fighting
men with a talent for entertain-
ment are wanted for the Army
Show. The entertainment group,
now being formed, is to consist al-
most entirely of men who were
soldiers to start with and who
will keep on being soldiers while
they are in the show business.

Since the army is being can-
vassed for men with talent, it is
not expected many outsiders will
be needed. But where they are
needed they will be enlisted and
will go on army pay, army rations,
wear uniform and undergo mili-
tary training.

Geoffrey Waddington, Toronto
orchestra leader, will be musical
director of the show and will join
the army for the purpose. He will
have to take training like any
other soldier and qualify for any
ranks given.

The primary purpose of the show
is the bolstering of morale within
the army. With this in view it is
considered desirable that soldiers
should be able to take pride in the
performance of the troops and re-
gard them as fellow soldiers, sec-
ondary purpose is recruiting which
is furthered by having a "round
marale within the army and also by
the interest in the army which the
show will foster in the minds of
younger Canadians who are either
at or approaching enlistment ago.

To Go On Air

It is hoped the show will go on
the air for at least half an hour
a week and so build up a listening
audience to which the army can
convey its message and through
which interest in the army as a
field of service can be stimulated
in the minds of prospective re-
cruits.

A training officer will accom-
pany the show when it goes on
the road and all members of the
troupe will go through the regu-
lar course of army training. It
may take them a little longer to
complete certain phases of train-
ing by reason of their work with
the show, but they will keep at
the job of training so they will be
ready for combatant posts should
it become necessary to assign them
to units.

Capt. Jack Reid of London and
Toronto has been appointed liaison
officer and is the main talent-
scout. One of his aims is to make
the show representative of all
Canada and to select men from
all military districts.

If three trombone players are
required and three good players
are found in Montreal they will
not be automatically signed up.
Reid will take a look around for
two equally good trombone players
in two other centres and thus get
three men from three different lo-
calities.

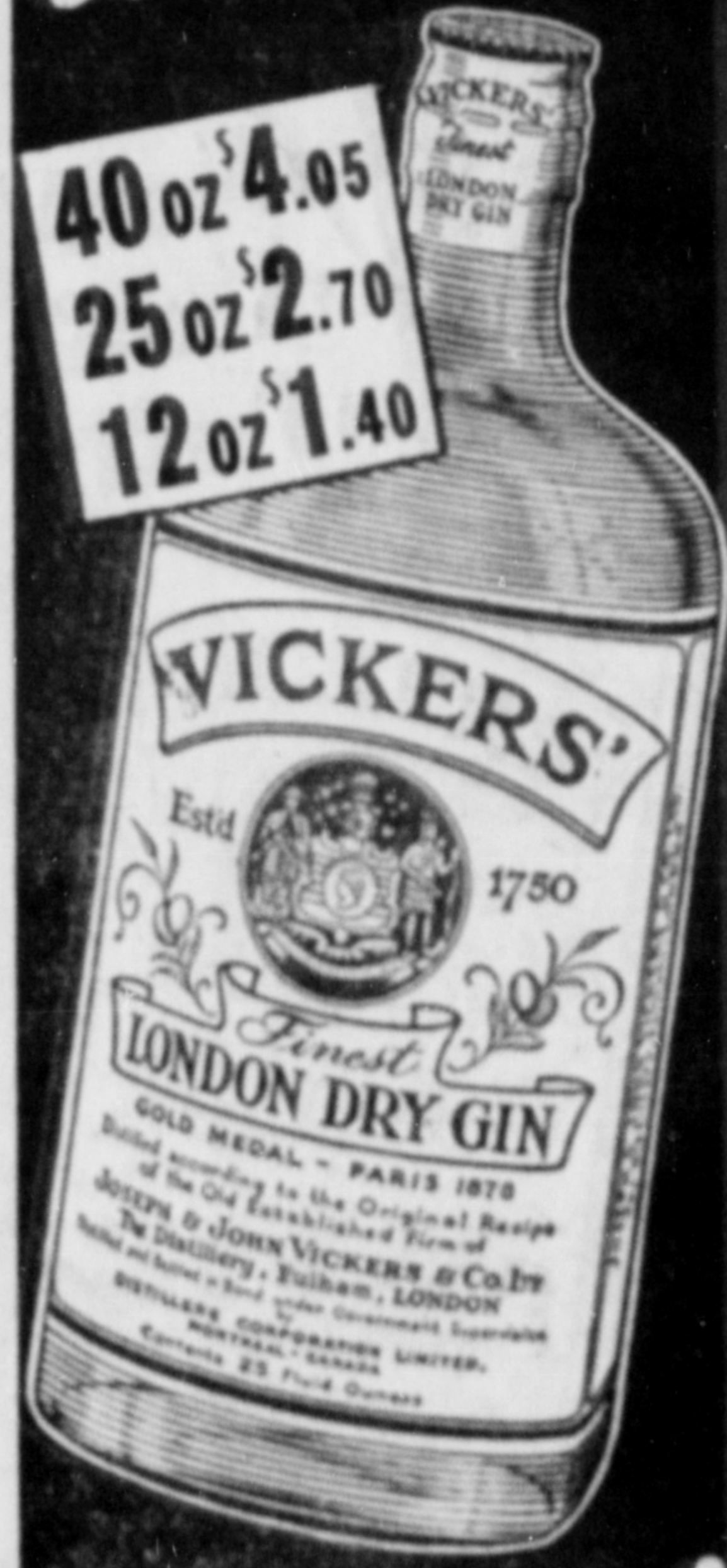
