JAPS SUFFER LOSSES

MELBOURNE, March 30: 10-Allied air operations over Lae on the north shore of New Guinea since March 10 have crippled over ten percent of the entire cruiser strength with which Japan entered the war, an Air Ministry communique said today. Japanese forces have made a twenty-seven mile withdrawal in the New Guinea as a result of floods rolling down the mountain sides in Markham Valley and their position is further menaced by heavy American and Australian air blows, Australian war reports said.
