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**The Budget . . .**  
 The 1942 war budget for Canada, presented to Parliament last night by Hon. J. L. Ilsley, minister of finance, imposes new and heavy burdens on Canadians all but they are not unbearable burdens. It appears to contain little that could not have been expected. Possibly it is even not as bad as some might have anticipated. There is no reason why Canadians, most of whom are at a peak of earning power, cannot take the imposts in their stride and cheerfully face sacrifices that doubtless are involved. Certainly, at least, there has been little suffering for the most of us so far even if there is a serious war on.

The revenue producing measures imposed upon us in the latest budget are still a far cry from what the people of Great Britain and other less privileged parts of the world have to meet. The compulsory savings and deduction at the income tax source features of the budget which we would say are quite satisfactory.

The cost of maintaining our democracy, our freedom, our way of living—everything we hold dear—is here in Canada still most reasonable. Mr. Ilsley's budget notwithstanding. The cost will probably be greater yet so we had better not start complaining now.

The budget is at the worst no worse than some folk expected.



Considering the disease we have to cope with, the budget pill is not so bitter.

The money we are compelled to save now may look a good deal bigger when we get it back after the war than it does today.

In fact, the budget is full of compensations.

Now that we have found the budget not such a headache after all, how about getting back to worrying about the war again?
