Resuming service after having been off for the past three weeks undergoing annual overhaul at Vancouver, Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived in port at 6:45 this morning from the south, sailing at noon in continuation of her voyage to Stewart and other northern points whence she will be back here tomorrow afternoon returning to Vancouver. The Catala brought in a good-sized list of passengers and substantial freight cargo.

With a capacity list of passengers and freight cargo including much of the latter for Prince Rupert, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 10:15 yesterday morning from Vancouver and sailed at 4 p.m. for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here southbound on Thursday afternoon. The Princess Norah had on board in all 180 passengers of whom eight disembarked here. Two went aboard the vessel here for the north.

INSPIRED

Showing of Impressive Victory Loan Pictures at Capitol Theatre This Morning.

To inspire local Victory Loan salesmen on the seriousness and importance of their task as a part of the war effort, an impressive showing of talking pictures was presented at the Capitol Theatre this morning.

With scenes of battle and conditions in war-ridden and subjugated countries, the pictures illustrated various phases of Canada's great war effort which up to the end of this year will have cost \$3,750,000,000. The necessity of more and more tanks, universal carriers, ships, guns, planes, ammunition and all the vast amount of other supplies required in waging total war and replacing enormous damage was graphically depicted.

There were also a number of inspiring speeches projected including excerpts from the address of Prime Minister Winston Churchill in the House of Commons.

The people of Canada had the money it was imperative that they loan it to their government, even if it might involve some temporary sacrifice and retrenchment, in order that their security and liberty might be maintained and the tyrant and the oppressor warded off. They must loan their bank balances and their future earnings. To prevent defeat, everything must be made available to meet the vast cost of victory.

At the conclusion of the showing of the pictures, Geoffrey Wootton, district organizer, spoke briefly, emphasizing the importance of the salesman's task and the duty of all citizens to do their share and encourage others to do likewise.
