Admittedly, there is a thrill in Ham getting the garden planted weeks earlier than usual and, if all goes well, there is also a thrill in picking the first flowers or sampling the first vegetables weeks ahead of the neighbors. But, as the ex- George Howe. perts point out, there is solid satisfaction at least in having the garden harvest last weeks longer than is possible when everything is planted on a single afternoon.

The beginner almost invariably suffers from an overdose of spring fever and plants too soon. There is no harm in planting a portion of the garden very early. T. Kasper vs. Mrs. W. W.
