WEATHER FOR MAY

Was Quite Favorable Month With Sunshine And Rain Less Than Usual

As usual, the month of May was a quite favorable one from the weather standpoint in Prince Rupert. The sunshine was somewhat under the average for the month but so also was the rainfall.

The sunshine for the month totalled 105.6 hours as compared with 179.7 hours in the same month last year. This brought sunshine for 1942 to date up to an aggregate of 383.6 hours in comparison with 551 hours in the first five months of 1941.

The rainfall of 3.30 inches this May compared with 4.13 inches in the same month last year, bringing the total for 1942 to date up to 36.71 inches as against 31.37 inches in the corresponding period of last year.

The weather summary for the month of May this year was issued last night by S. G. Mellor, Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist, and is as follows:

Maximum barometer reading at sea level, 30.307 on May 5.
 Minimum barometer reading at sea level, 29.605 on May 25.
 Maximum temperature, 71.5 on May 12.
 Minimum temperature, 38 on May 2.

Mean temperature, 51.3.
 Total precipitation, 3.30 inches.
 Total sunshine, 105.6 hours.
 Maximum wind velocity, southeast, 27 miles per hour, May 1.

Timely Recipes

DELICIOUS CREOLE SAUCE
 1 medium onion, diced.
 2 cloves garlic, chopped very finely.

1 pimiento, diced.
 1/2 cup uncooked ham (cut in small pieces).
 2 tablespoons cooking oil or fat.
 1 can condensed tomato soup.
 1/4 cup water.
 2 teaspoons sugar.

Saute the very finely chopped garlic, diced onions, diced ham, and diced pimiento in the cooking oil or fat 10-12 minutes until onions are soft and transparent. Then add tomato soup and water, cover and simmer 1/4 hour. Add sugar just before removing from fire. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce.

DR. JEKYLL AND HYDE

Famous Robert Louis Stevenson Story Here With Spencer Tracy In Title Role

Thrills and drama and an excellent cast combine to make the new picturization of the famous detective story, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," coming to the Capitol Theatre screen this Wednesday and Thursday a most exciting film. Spencer Tracy plays the dual character with Lana Turner as the fiancée and Ingrid Bergman as a "bad girl."

Tracy displays his usual artistry in delineating the double personality of the good Dr. Jekyll and the evil Mr. Hyde. Miss Turner injects a spirited flavor to the role of the Victorian girl who is willing to defy convention for the love of her sweetheart. Miss Bergman's dramatic work in the picture is also said to be memorable.

The picture is, of course, adapted from Robert Louis Stevenson's famous thriller. The fine work of Fredric March in the first talking picture version of the story is remembered by movie fans. Tracy is said to be equally good with the advantage of being able himself to change facial characteristics without as much artificial assistance.

GIRLS ARE 'KHAKE-MAD'

Some Turning to Larceny as Children Flock Back to London

LONDON, June 9 (P) — Juvenile delinquency has hit a new high in London where children's laughter echoes through the streets just a year from the time when girls and boys were a rare sight in the capital.

Raid-free nights and warmer weather have brought the children from the country and evacuation centres to their city homes. It has been estimated unofficially that there are 180,000 youngsters here with 1,500 arriving weekly.

Meanwhile, police report that a steady stream of youngsters are appearing in court. On one day alone 60 cases were heard. "One disturbing feature is the large number of girls coming before the court," said Eileen Younghusband, chairman of the West London Juvenile Court. "They are turning to larceny and to breaking and entering. There is a new temptation for them to break into evacuated homes or to wander among bombed buildings, unaware that looting is a crime."

A probation officer, describing some girls as "khaki-mad," said the sight of a uniform turns their head. It begins as harmless hero-worship, but a little flattery from their hero and there is no keeping them at home. Others "make fools of themselves" by running after older men or by falling into the clutches of undesirable companions.
