

# EVERYBODY SHOULD VOTE AND VOTE 'YES' ASSERTS HANSON ON PLEBISCITE

No Chances Should Be Taken About Backing Government In Its Plan To Win War By Removing C

"Everybody should vote in the plebiscite and everybody should vote for Skeena, who arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning to spend a few days and at Smithers in the course of the Easter session of Parliament at Ottawa. It is very important, Mr.

Hanson feels, that there should be a most emphatic affirmative vote. Thus the government will be accorded a mandate to go full speed ahead with all phases of the total war effort, the critical need of which is becoming more apparent with each passing day.

## King Asks Free Hand

OTTAWA, April 8:—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, in a radio broadcast last night, said that the government was asking through the forthcoming manpower plebiscite for a free hand to carry on the war. The pledge given at the last general election against conscription was not legally binding, declared Mr. King, but it was a moral obligation which could not be ignored in a democratic country. The pledge had been given at the time in order to preserve national unity.

## AXIS MOVE IN AFRICA

Another Push, Involving 125,000 Men, Appears Under Way on Libyan Desert.

LONDON, April 8:—Axis forces numbering 125,000 deserters were reported in motion across the Libyan Desert today against British lines in what may be the opening of a spring drive to conquer Egypt and smash through east of Suez toward the southern Russian flank. The action came as the German air force launched worst raids of the war against the tiny island fortress of Malta and Alexandria, the chief Egyptian port and base of the British Mediterranean fleet.

## CUT DOWN ON BOOZE

## Defence Unit For Smithers

People of Bulkley Valley to Organize Against Emergency.

# Pacific Coast Guerillas

## Chances of Settlement Of India Issue on Side of Allies Looks Better

Meanwhile Situation in Philippines Is Becoming More Acute and Position of United Nations in Burma Is Extremely Grave.

LONDON, April 8: (CP)—New hope for a settlement which would enrol India's millions on the side of the Allies arose today while in the Philippines the situation became more acute as Japanese troops pressed a headlong offensive against the defenders of Bataan. Reuters said the executive committee of the powerful All-India Congress was discussing a new formula regarding India defences which was generally accepted.

## REDS MAKE BIG SMASH

Drive Across Dneiper River in Effort to Crush Nazi Armies on Central Front.

LONDON, April 8: (CP)—Soviet forces have smashed across the upper Dneiper River in a furious final drive to pinch off the Vyasma-Gzhatsk-Rzhev bulge toward Moscow. Soviet dispatches said today. The Red Army appears intent on utilizing the brief period remaining before the spring thaw to crush Nazi armies in the central front and prepare to meet later the German offensive from the direction of Smolensk.

Speaking of the session which is now recessed Mr. Hanson stated that business of the war transcended all other questions. Alongside the war, general administration business pales into insignificance.

The score in the air war between Germany and Russia yesterday was 79 to 19 in favor of Russia. In the last eight days some 500 German planes have been brought down by the Russians who have lost only about one-fifth of that number themselves.

## GOOD SHOTS AT PREMIER

Two Marksmen There Win Expert Shield Awards.

MONTREAL, April 8:—Two members of the Premier Rifle Club at Premier have succeeded in gaining the Expert Shield Award, one of the highest distinctions in sporting rifle marksmanship, it is announced from the headquarters of the Dominion Marksmen organization here.

They are W. G. Murray, secretary of the club, who posted a score of 5911 out of the possible 6000 points, and A. G. Shethre who posted 5907 points and holds the honor of being the first member of the club to win this shield.

It requires outstanding marksmanship to post a score better than the necessary minimum of 5860 points of the possible 6000 in this competition in which each marksman must shoot 20 targets from each of the standing, sitting and prone positions.

## Terrace Having Salvage Drive

Red Cross Will Collect All Sorts of Materials There.

TERRACE, April 8:—Terrace Red Cross is sponsoring a salvage campaign. The intention is to ask the railway to make available a car. It is hoped the co-operation of local truckmen can be enlisted.

Metals of all sorts, rags, fibre and bottles are the lines it is intended to collect for the war effort. Donations of time, material and transportation facilities may be made to the local committee.

## WOMEN ARE MOBILIZED

Compulsory Service Applied to Those Able and Not Already in "Useful" Work.

LONDON, April 8: (CP)—Britain has on record the names of 11,000,000 women—approximately 60 percent of the nation's adult female population—registered under government order. Every British woman, married and single, from 20 to 37 inclusive, has registered. Those younger and older will have their names taken when their age groups are called. From information it obtains at registration, the ministry of labor and national service decides what women are available for war service.

On the Burma front the situation remains extremely grave with the Japanese reorganizing to attack. British troops holding the line only sixty-five miles from the rich central Burma oil fields.



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Registration normally is followed by an interview. Women with no jobs are called for interviews first, followed by those already employed, depending on the importance of their work. Compulsory service takes one of two forms—conscription to the women's auxiliary services, at present applicable only to women born in 1920 and 1921, and direction to work in industry.

Can Volunteer  
Single women between the ages of 20 and 37 inclusive are given the opportunity of volunteering for the services or for other war work, but this does not necessarily mean they will be placed in the job they want. Their preference, however, will be taken into consideration when they are posted to factories or the services but they must be prepared to leave home unless this would mean exceptional hardship.

Single women with domestic responsibilities for them to take a job possible for the mto to take a job will not be expected to do so, but they may be asked to discuss their position with a women's panel. Married women with children under 14 cannot be called up but are free to volunteer for full or part-time jobs. The same applies to expectant mothers.

Other married women, with husbands at home or in the forces, are dealt with in the same way as single women of their age group, with due regard to their domestic responsibilities. They are not asked to leave their home town if directed into industry, and cannot be conscripted into the services.

### As To Widows

Widows with no young children living with them are in the same position as single women in the same age group, but special regard is given to women recently widowed. Women who marry after joining the service are still members of the force in which they are enrolled and cannot leave without permission.

Any woman, except those in the 1920-21 groups, can volunteer for the services or a war job and her application normally will be accepted unless her present job is covered by an essential work order. Permission of the ministry is needed before a woman can quit an essential job.

## Militia Rangers Are Being Organized For Protection of B.C.

One Hundred and Fifty Such Units May Be Formed—

Will Not Be Uniformed and Will Use Own Arms

OTTAWA, April 8: (CP)—Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, told a press conference today that guerilla units which may eventually total 150 units are being organized on the Pacific Coast. He said that a battle training school for such type of warfare was being established somewhere in the west.

Men in the guerilla groups will probably be called Militia Rangers and will be organized by Major T. A. H. Taylor. They will not wear uniforms but may be issued arm bands and will use largely their own firearms.

## Nehru Urges Indians To Resist Jap

NEW DELHI, April 8: Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, former president of the All-India Congress, yesterday urged all Indians to resist Japanese aggression. Any professions by Japan of friendly motives must be considered absurd and "wholly false." This was clear in view of deeds in China and Korea. Nehru considered it his duty to resist any interference with India by foreign nations.

Montreal, April 8:—Records in honeymoon travel were established during Easter Monday at Bonaventure station of the Canadian National Railways when fifty-three happy married couples boarded trains for various parts of Canada including Niagara Falls.

The total number established a record for Bonaventure station while a second record was set by the "Maritime Express," noon-day train for Halifax, which carried twenty-seven newlyweds for stations in Quebec and the Maritimes.

Other principal trains which had honeymoon passengers were those for Sherbrooke, Ottawa and the day Toronto trains.

Train time is always busy at Bonaventure these days but Easter Monday provided a day to be remembered because every couple came to the station accompanied by friends and relatives. Flowers were in abundance and confetti and rice, were far too plentiful for those who have to keep the building neat and clean.

Quite a proportion of the honeymoon couples had grooms from the military forces, all branches of the service being represented.

## RESTRICT TELEPHONES

Strict Priority Ratings to Be Applied in Canada.

OTTAWA, April 8:—Telephone services in Canada are to be brought under strict priority ratings on the basis of essential function. Companies may refuse to supply or continue services unless considered necessary to the defence of Canada or carrying on of essential industry or business.

The Bell Telephone Co. of Montreal says the new restrictions may lead to inconvenience or even hardship to accustomed telephone users.
