The price of baby beef yearling steer and heifer carcasses and sides ranges from 18½c to 20½c and cow and bull carcasses and sides from 151/4c to 171/4c.

# WAR SOON

Implement President's Demand

MEXICO, May 29. - Congress of Mexico, House and Senate, are expected to act by next Tuesday on President Camacho's demand for a formal declaration of war against the Axis powers. That the demand will be implemented by that time by both houses is expected in official quarters. Camacho asked that a state of war be declared to have existed since last Friday when the dead-line expired for Germany to give a satisfactory explanation of torpedoing of Mexican ships.

"We tried to avoid violence but violence came hunting us," declared the President in his message. War must be declared to preserve the honor and clear the name of Mexico. The people would have to face sacrifice and danger.
