Edouard Herriot . . .

Edouard Herriott, whose death is reported, was three times Premier of France and was one of the Rally Day service at 11 a.m. most widely travelled of French statesmen, with one of the widest international viewpoints. He knew Europe, including Russia, very well. Youthful tal- First Presbyterian Church ents gave him his start upwards. Herriot was elected to the chamber of deputies after relinquishing his senate seat, in November, 1919. He soon found himself the head of the historic radical and radical-socialist party which, despite its name, upheld only a sort of mild democratic liberalism, with anti-clerical leanings. He fought in opposition until the elections of May, 1924, returned his party and its socialist allies to power. There began his first premiership.

Financial problems, coupled with a stinging attack by ex-President Poincare, brought Herriot down to ship with the congregation is exdefeat on Good Friday of 1925. He was succeeded in the premiership by Paul Painleve, and himself took up the speakership of the chamber. In July of 1926, Herriot descended from the speaker's rostrum to combat the then Briand-Caillaux government on financial measures; caused its overthrow, and was told to form a cabinet himself. His combination, however, lasted only 48 hours, due to lack of confidence abroad—the franc was at 50 to the dollar. Then in came Poincare again with his "national union" government-wherein he made Herriot, whom he had always admired personally, minister of education. Herriot remained in that office until 1928.

The "all left" elections of May, 1932, brought Herriot back into power as premier and foreign minister for the third time. But it was a different Herriot-a far more nationalistic one than the Herriot of 1924 liberalism.

At the Lausanne conference in June, 1932. he agreed to the paring down of German reparations to a global sum of 3,000,000.000 gold marks. And at the same time he brought off the "gentleman's agreement" with England, providing for closer co-operation in foreign policy.

Because of his insistence that France should pay her war debt installment due the United States, and at the appointed time, Herriot was overthrown by the chamber on Dec. 14, 1932. President Lebrun offered him a chance to form another ministry, but Herriot declined. Finally Joseph Paul-Boncour. minister of war in the Heriot combine, was called to constitute a cabinet and accepted, taking Herriot's portfolio of foreign affairs.

This cabinet lasted only a couple of months and was succeeded by one under Edouard Deladier. Again Herriot was offered a place, but again declined so long as the chamber of deputies upheld the default on the American debt. But he remained in the forefront of affairs and was one of the most influential figures in France. Since the war he had been in eclipse.
